Back to Health



Up in the north woods section of Wisconsin is the Lake Tomahawk State camp where men convalescents from Wisconsin tuberculosis sanatoria learn to "harden in" and foolproof the cure. The patient begins with an hour a day at some housekeeping job. His work is gradually increased until he is devoting five to eight hours a day to such occupations as landscape gardening, truck farming, carpentry, and road building. In the picture above the patients are mixing cement for the foundation of a new building for the camp. A physician checks each man's health, and his rehabilitation schedule is built around his individual history, condition and aptitudes. Sixty-six per cent of the graduates have reported that they have worked regularly since they came "back to health" at the camp. Christmas Seal funds help to support rehabilitation programs throughout the country.

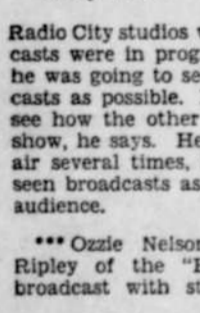
