SHAW TO SPEAK TO SHEEP BREEDERS

Sheep breeders of Washington county are displaying considerable interest in the approaching meeting to be held in the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce rooms, Wednesday, January 13, at 1:30 p.m., according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent.

J. N. Shaw, veterinarian from the Oregon State Experiment Station, will discuss with sheep breeders some of the problems and difficulties they annually wrestle with during the winter in their farm flocks of sheep. Lambs, weak lambs, and parasitic troubles will be discussed and sheep raisers will have an opportunity of asking questions concerning their own difficulties in their own flocks. The meeting is open to anyone raising sheep.

SOON TO FINISH MAP OF FOREST SURVEY

The monumental task of cruising and mapping forest resources of Oregon and Washington swung into its final lap last week when W. H. Bolles of the Pacific Northwest Forest Experiment Station, U. S. Forest Service ran the last mile of timber cruise in Baker County, northeastern Oregon. The forest survey authorized by act of congress in 1928 became a major project of the experiment station in this region in 1930 and has since been steadily advanced under direction of H. J. Andrews, chief of the section. The cruising and type mapping of Washington forests was finished a year ago, leaving the notheast corner of Oregon to be completed in 1936. Technically trained timber estimators and mappers have now returned to Portland from the Blue mountains of Oregon with word that all field work of the survey has been accomplished.

Meanwhile the office staff of draftsmen has been preparing maps to show the location of all classes of timber growth and computers have been compiling volume of tree species and areas of forest types by ownership class.

One of the products of the forest survey is a lithographed map showing in colors some 25 different classifications of forest growth such as old growth, Douglas fir, spruce-hemlock, second growth, subalpine type, recent cutovers, and burns. These maps give an extremely graphic picture of the forest situation, being printed on four sheets to each state on a scale of one-fourth inch to the mile. Maps and statistics for the Douglas fir region of western Oregon and Washington were completed first and have been available to the public for some time.

In addition to the inventory of forest resources, other phases of the survey include study of the rate of forest depletion from fire, cutting and other causes, and study of actual and potential growth. These data are held essential to any economic forecast upon which intelligent sustained yield forest management or stabilized forest industry can be based.

PROGRAM SERVICE LAUNCHED BY O.S.C.

"Oregon in a Can", "Millions of Eggsells", "This Little Pig Went to Oregon", "The Old Woman in the Shoe".

These intriguing titles and a number of others designate parts of a new program service for rural organizations just launched by the O.S.C. extension service under the direction of J. R. Beck, for many years county agent of Polk county and now extension specialist in rural service.

To every grange lecturer and farmers' union program committee in the state has been mailed a copy of one of these prepared programs, which are designed to form the basis of an evening's forum or discussion meeting. The program outlines supplied by the extension service are prepared in attractive mimeograph form and contain basic facts on the subject and many suggestions for obtaining related local information.

Although only one "sample" program has been sent out to each organization, any or all of the program outlines may be obtained free of cost not only by granges and farmers' unions but by any other group or organization which desires to make use of them, says Mr. Beck.

Five program outlines have been prepared so far and others are in the making. "Oregon in a Can" deals with the rapidly expanding food procession, industry which takes the products of 40,000 of Oregon's best acres. "Millions of Eggsells" gives the highlights of Oregon's commercial egg industry and raises questions on poultry production and marketing.

"This Little Pig Went to Oregon" deals with swine production and marketing and shows that Oregon is still importing pork products equal to a grand total of 250,000 hogs annually. "The Old Woman in the Shoe" presents in an attractive manner the names and classifications of the leading soil types found in Oregon and shows how these may be used to local advantage. The first of a marketing series deals with exports and imports and presents facts on both sides of the tariff question.

OREGON LEGISLATURE TO CONVENE MONDAY

(Continued from Front Page) duction law enacted two years ago, expires in March. School teachers are asking for a retirement fund, and help for fire-stricken Bandon.

Hood River plans to go before the assembly with legislation planned to prevent strikes. Laborites, armed with a recent supreme court decision that they can picket "peacefully" regardless of whether or not there is an issue between the employer and employees, may ask that state police and national guardsmen be kept out of labor controversies. Another proposal heard is that the state control hiring halls, this control factor being one of the major impediments to maritime peace.

Among other matters gaining attention will be a fight against the Oregon milk control board by interests opposed to the price fixing power of that board; "prepaid medicine" opposed by the medical society; and jury selections, opposed by lawyers.

A number of bills will be aimed at receipts from horse and dog racing. Among these is a bill to end legalized racing; a bill to appropriate the first \$35,000 of receipts to the state fair; a bill to appropriate \$5000 of such receipts for the Lakeview rodeo; one to provide \$1500 for a central Oregon potato show; another for \$5000 to the Portland Rose Festival.

The proposed Wilsonville cut-off, putting Salem and Portland

four miles closer; the water level highway up the Columbia river gorge from Portland to The Dalles, are among other matters before the lawmakers.

Prunes have been the one crop in the county in 1936 which to date has not shown an improved condition as regards price and market.
