Stuffed Cabbage (Norwegian)
1 medium-sized head cabbage
1½ pounds ground beef
½ pound ground fresh pork
1 onion, grated
1 cup dry bread or cracker crumbs

2 eggs, beaten
Salt and pepper

Cut the top from a head of cabbage. With a sharp knife, scoop out the center of the head. Have beef and pork ground together. Combine with bread or cracker crumbs. Season with salt and pepper and grated onion, and moisten with beaten eggs. Fill the hollow cabbage head with the meat mixture. Put top in place and tie securely with white string. Wrap with cheesecloth or a towel, and tie ends together. Cover with boiling water and allow to simmer until the meat is done, about one hour. To serve, remove cabbage head from cloth, and take off the string. Cut into slices and serve with white sauce as the gravy.

Italian Meat Balls

2 pounds ground beef
2 slices bread, soaked
2 medium-sized onions
½ cup grated cheese
2 eggs, beaten
Salt and pepper
2 tablespoons lard
1 cup tomato puree
1 clove garlic
½ cup celery
½ cup mushrooms, if desired

Combine ground beef and soaked bread. Season with salt and pepper. Moisten with beaten eggs and shape into balls. Brown these in hot lard. Make a sauce of tomato puree with an equal quantity of water, and seasoned with a little garlic, celery, and mushrooms, if desired. Put browned meat balls into tomato sauce, and let cook until done. Serve both meat balls and sauce on a platter of cooked macaroni. Sprinkle all with grated cheese.

"Jul-Nissen"

1 lb. caramels
½ cup cream
Hot Boiled Rice
Melt the caramels in top of double boiler. Add cream and mix well. Pour this as hot candy sauce over mounds of hot boiled rice.

Mexican Salad

2 oranges
1 grapefruit
2 ripe bananas
2 apples
4 small beets
¼ cup coarsely chopped peanuts
2 tbsps. crushed peppermint candy
1 tbsps. lime or lemon juice
1½ tbsps. salad oil
¼ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. chili powder
Peel oranges and grapefruit; remove membrane from sections

and dice. Peel and dice bananas, apples and beets. Make a dressing of the lime or lemon juice, salad oil, salt and chili powder. Combine all ingredients lightly but thoroughly. Serve well chilled on crisp lettuce. Serves 6 to 8.

Waffle Torte

½ cup boiling water
½ tsp. soda
½ cup dates, cut fine
½ cup sugar
½ cup flour
½ tsp. butter
½ cup nuts, chopped fine
1 egg well beaten
Sprinkle soda over dates, and pour over them the hot water; let stand until cool. Cream butter, mix flour and sugar together and add to batter; when smooth add to date mixture; stir in nuts and well beaten egg. Bake in waffle iron for about 4 minutes. Makes 4 "waffle tortes". Serve with whipped cream or hard sauce for dessert.

Orange Sugared Walnuts

1 cup sugar
1/3 cup white corn syrup
¼ cup water
3 tbsps. orange juice
¼ tsp. grated orange rind
¼ lb. shelled walnut halves
Cook sugar, water, syrup and orange juice together to 240° F. (or until little dropped in cold water forms a firm ball). Remove from heat, add orange rind and walnuts; stir until syrup begins to look cloudy. Before it hardens, drop by spoonful on waxed paper or oiled surface.

"My son-in-law used a washing machine motor for the power-plant. Guiding is done with one lever and acceleration and braking with another."

Until the snow gets too deep, Mr. Jones even cranks up his power-plant by giving the chair's wheels a push or two and chugs off to winter-time basket-ball games in his vicinity, too.

New York World's Fair Site From 9,000 Feet Up



NEW YORK, (Special).—Photography and ingenuity combine to show about how the New York Fair will appear in 1939 to visitors arriving from the west in planes flying at an altitude of one and three-quarters miles. Cameraman made this "shot" from a plane over the New Jersey meadows. Shown in the foreground is the shipping along the Hudson—Manhattan with its towers grouped about the Empire State building (center) which houses present headquarters of the Fair—and in the middle distance the 1,216½ acre site of the 1939 international exposition. To the right lies

Brooklyn and, beyond, the hinterland of Long Island. At the extreme left, spanning the East river, is the new Triborough bridge over which many of the 50,000,000 visitors expected at the Fair will motor to the convenient parking lots. A photograph of the table model of the Fair has been superimposed on the negative of the air view to show the grid of the central exhibit zone, the boat basin being constructed on Flushing Bay and the lagoons that will feature the exposition's amusement zone.
