Modarelli, Noted Conductor, Finds Americans Natural Music-Lovers



FINE music is today taking its rightfully important place in American life because people who once were "awed by the austere atmosphere of the concert and opera stage have been awakened to music's inherent beauty" through the mediums of radio and motion pictures, according to Antonio Modarelli, one of the country's youngest composers and conductors.

This popularity of good music will continue to flourish, he declared, because Americans have a natural eye and ear for beauty, and are quick to react to the emotional appeal of beautiful melodies. It is the duty of every musician to foster this natural instinct for good music by doing away with the false trappings with which it has been associated in the past, he asserted.

Mr. Modarelli, who is conductor of the 75-piece Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, called attention to the radio programs now being presented by his orchestra.

"Our purpose has been to present the best of the world's music introduced in a simple manner," he said. "Good music has too often in the past been presented austere, especially on the air, where announcements of the most academic sort have frequently confused the listener and dulled his appreciation of the native beauty of the music. Most of the great masters were people of the soil, and I am sure they had no intention of provoking profound and wordy dissertations. Certainly they intended their work to have primarily an emotional, rather than an intellectual appeal."

"Radio can exert a tremendous influence in spreading an appreciation of good music," he continued, "by letting music speak for itself, by giving people a simple presentation of the beautiful melodies which stimulate the emotions. Americans have a natural musical instinct, but they can be scared off when the approach to beauty is made too formidable for their enjoyment of it."

Salem News Letter

Governor Charles H. Martin, who just a few days before the general election in November called upon the people of this state to vote "no" on all the measures on the ballot, told the legislature in joint session Monday that the people had issued their mandate by their overwhelming "no" vote.

In this the governor cautioned the solons to abstain from making any new laws that would increase the debt of that state or add any taxes. He called attention to the fact that Oregon now stands ahead of her sister states—without a deficit, and with \$200,000 surplus.

Other recommendations in the message, given at the opening session of the 39th legislature, were:

"That the entire bonded debt of the state can be eliminated by 1960.

"That the state budget is balanced and that there be no deviations from that budget that would call for extra revenue.

"That we must steer a sound and sensible course that will keep us from disaster on the rocks of sappy sentimentality and the equally dangerous reefs of the greedy vicious, vested interests, opposed to the common good."

Taking cognizance of the toll being exacted by the maritime strike, the governor said:

"We must not tolerate any

activity which tends to divide the people of the nation or this state into classes that appear hostile to each other."
