



"Double Dealers" Don't Stay Single

Deck your meals with double-deckers and of arithmetic means anything! They'll be twice as good! If one sandwich is good, two are better; if one kind of cake is tasty, two kinds are tastier still. Scarcely or some other wiseacre might find fault with such logic, but your guests never will; hence, the double-decker!

"Take two, they are so small remember that old phrase of your ancestors as she passed the plate? That will never be necessary with double-decker dishes. Remember the dormitory bed, the pullman car berth? That's double-decking with a vengeance, and what we recommend this time for your dishes.

Two-Fruit Sandwich Salad

When a salad is a "sandwich" of smooth ripe banana between two slices of golden orange it earns the hostess double compliments—one for the salad and one for the sandwich!

3 oranges
3 ripe bananas
Lettuce
3 tins. lemon juice
1/4 cup finely chopped nuts (walnuts, almonds, pecans or peanuts)
Peel oranges, cutting deep enough to remove white membrane; cut into 1/4 inch slices. On lettuce-covered salad plate place 2 orange slices. Cover with 2 lengthwise quarters of bananas sprinkled with lemon juice and rolled in nuts. Top with slice of orange. Garnish with mayonnaise and maraschino cherry. Serves 6.

Six-Layer Dinner

Your guests will never recognize your left-over rice when it's snowy goodness makes a foundation for this six-layer dinner dish.

1 cup rice
2 cups potatoes
1 can tomatoes
1/4 cup celery
Green pepper
2 cups meat (1/3 pork sausage or cooked hamburger; 2/3 ground beef)
1 onion

Arrange in a casserole, first the rice (either raw or cooked), then

ground meat, raw sliced potatoes, sliced onion, tomatoes, chopped celery and green pepper. Dot the layer of tomatoes with pieces of butter and top with green pepper. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) for one hour.

Double-Decker Date Whip

It's twice as good as usual to be "dated up" for dessert when pretty stemmed glasses hold double-decker date whip!

1 pkg. orange flavored gelatin
1 cup warm water
1/4 pkg. dates, sliced
1 cup fresh orange juice
1/4 cup nutmeats, chopped
Dissolve gelatin according to package directions; add orange juice and cool until mixture begins to thicken; pour half the mixture into stemmed glasses; cover with 1/2 cup sliced dates and nuts; set in a cold place. Cool remainder of gelatin until partially set; beat with a rotary beater until fluffy; pour the whipped jelly over clear mixture containing dates and nuts. Chill until firm; serve with whipped cream garnished with slice of orange, a slice of date. Serves 4.

2 or 3-Tiered Layer Cake

Three dainty layers make a festive party cake for "super" parties!

1/2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/4 cup water
3 tins. baking powder
2 cups flour
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 cup orange juice
1/4 tsp. grated orange rind
Cream butter, add sugar gradually, then well beaten egg yolks, grated orange rind, orange juice and water, slowly. Sift the flour, salt and baking powder together and add half of it to the cake mixture. Fold in one-half the beaten egg whites. Mix well between each addition. Bake in two large or three small greased layer cake pans in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes. Put together with whipped cream or favorite filling and frost top and sides with orange butter frosting.

Orange Butter Frosting
Cream 4 tablespoons butter and

stir in 1/4 cup confectioner's sugar; gradually stir in unbeaten yolk of one egg and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add 1 1/2 cups sugar and 2 tablespoons fresh orange juice, a little at a time as frosting thickens. When of creamy consistency spread on cake.

Corn Souffle

Just twice as "puffed up" as plain corn pudding, a corn souffle makes light of the luncheon problem.

1 tins. flour
1/2 cup milk
1 tins. liquid shortening
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. paprika
Pepper
1 canned pimiento
2 cups canned corn
2 eggs
Make a white sauce of flour, milk, shortening and seasonings. Rub the pimiento through a sieve and add to the sauce. Add corn to the mixture. Cool slightly then add well beaten egg yolks and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into well-oiled baking dish, set dish in a pan of hot water, and bake in moderate oven (375 deg. F.) until egg is set, about 30 minutes.
