



Little Things To Do At Home NOW IT'S COCONUT

It's gingerbread with coconut 'cung now! The old favorite combinations are still going strong—ice cream, whipped cream and apple sauce with gingerbread—but there's new "star" performer—gingerbread with coconut icing! Make the gingerbread according to your own special recipe. Frost with:

Coconut Icing

2 egg whites, unbeaten
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/3 cup cold water
1 tbsp. white corn syrup
1 teasp. vanilla
1 cup coconut

Place all ingredients except vanilla in top of double boiler and beat with rotary egg-beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over boiling water; beat until frosting will form peaks when beater is lifted—7 to 10 minutes. Remove from stove; add vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread. For filling between layers remove about 1/3 of frosting to small bowl and add 1/4 cup coconut. Spread remainder of frosting over top and sides of cake and sprinkle with remaining 1/4 cup coconut.

CANDY

Early spring and May showers—what to do but make candy at home? For the youngsters this is a "circus"! Make colored lollipops, wrap each in waxed paper and then tie four or five "them on a string, a lion or other "stand up" animal from the ten cent store. Here is a recipe for wholesome pops:

Lollipops

2 cups sugar
2/3 cup white corn syrup
1 cup water
1/2 teasp. oil of peppermint
Put sugar, corn syrup and water into saucepan and stir over low fire until sugar is dissolved. Cook without stirring until temperature of 310 degrees F. is reached. Remove from fire and add coloring and flavoring and stir only enough to mix. Drop from tip of tablespoon on smooth oiled slab or baking sheet. Press one end of toothpick or skewer into each.

FRY THAT SQUASH

Delicious and delicate, and just the thing for Spring appetites is fried squash made this way: Peel squash, cut into slices

about 1/4 inch thick. Season with salt and pepper, add a dash of sugar and sprinkle each slice with a bit of grated onion. Dip in crumbs, beaten eggs, and the crumbs again; fry in hot salad oil until delicate brown.

SCALLOPED BANANAS

"For Goodness Sake"—there's a new Scallop dish on the menu horizon! Alternate layers of delicious sliced bananas and baked and all ready to serve in 15 to 20 minutes! The tested recipe for this new dish is given below:

2 cups fine bread crumbs
3 tbsps. melted butter
2 medium sized bananas
1 teasp. lemon juice
Sprinkling of salt
Sprinkling of nutmeg
2 tbsps. brown sugar
2 tbsps. butter, cut in pieces
Brown bread crumbs in melted butter. Mix thinly sliced bananas with lemon juice, and add salt, nutmeg and sugar. Place a layer of crumbs in buttered baking dish. Cover with layer of bananas, and top with crumbs. Dot with 1/2 of the butter. Make a second layer of bananas, a second layer of butter, in a moderate oven (375) 15 to 20 minutes or until bananas are done. Serve warm with hot orange sauce. Four servings.

Orange Sauce

1/2 cup sugar
1 teasp. cornstarch
3/4 cup boiling water
2 tbsps. butter
1/2 cup orange juice
1 teasp. grated orange rind
1 teasp. lemon juice
Few grains cinnamon
Few grains salt
Mix sugar and cornstarch. Add water gradually, stirring constantly. Boil five minutes. Butte from heat. Stir in butter, orange juice, orange rind, lemon juice, cinnamon and salt.

START RIGHT

Let grapefruit and avocado cocktail start your meal with perfect taste. To make it chill and cube 2 ripe avocados and 3 medium sized grapefruit. Add 1 finely chopped green pepper; mix and serve in cocktail glasses with cocktail sauce made by combining 1/3 of each of mayonnaise, whipped cream and chili sauce; add a teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce. Pour over fruit and serve.

IT'S "CRUMBY"—AND GOOD

If your family are non-crust eaters don't worry about left-over heels of bread! Dress 'em up in a Date Delight! To make bread 2 wellbeaten eggs, one-half cup sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup chopped dates and 1/2 cup chopped walnuts. Cook over boiling water for 30 minutes. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream.
