### Summary Of Production Is Given

(Continued from Front Page), come would place on the market approximately 6100 pounds of fat. Thus, 1800 pounds more fat had to go on the market from the lower producers, yet the income was no greater.

Herd improvement work in Washington county is progressing. More interest is being displayed and there are a number of herd owners who would like to get their herds on test. Fred Jossy who has been testing for a number of years remarked last week that, "Getting into a herd improvement association is generally a profitable thing to do. More dairymen should be testing." The present association is full at this

time but with a few more requests for testing it may be possible that an association be organized. Julius Christensen president of the local group, in commenting on testing sometime ago remarked, "Belonging to a herd improvement association is just good business. The tester comes in once a month weighs the milk, runs the butterfat test, computes the production from each animal in the herd for the month, makes up the herd book, feed costs are entered, and at the end of the year the bookkeeping job, showing exactly where the dairy enterprise stands and the relation of each cow to this business, is complete. It is a valuable service."

David Hagg and Sons had the high producing cow for the year, a grade Jersey. She produced 11,662 pounds of milk, containing 726.8 pounds of fat. Members having herds that
