If a prize is ever awarded to a maestro for original radio planning, A. Rolfe, the jovial bachelorette, will get it. Recently he devised a special "chuckle" orchestra for use on comedy programs and he is now developing an Hawaiian rumba band.

Rolfe's program, broadcast three times a week over CBS, is the most popular daytime musical.

***Jay C. Flippen, for years a vaudeville star, is now having such outstanding success with his "Broadway Melodies" over Stations WHN and WOR on Wednesday nights, that it will probably be a network program in the fall. He presents famous vaudeville headliners as well as his regular stars.

***Lovely Jean O'Neill, talented newcomer to radio, who is being heard Monday nights over 42 stations, was discovered singing in a music publisher's office and presented to Fred Allen. He put her on his program twice, and then she landed a feature spot on her own program with the Barry McKimley, Hughie Barrett's orchestra and the Tune Twisters.

***Favorite lounging place of Radio City musicians right now is the studio where Louis Armstrong rehearses on Friday for the "Harlem" broadcasts. Men with fiddles, saxophones, cornets, etc., tucked under their arms almost fill the studio during rehearsal.

***Radio's busiest tenor is going to take it easy most of the summer. Morton Bower, who has heard six times weekly this winter, is now heard Friday nights over the NBC Blue network. He's devoting the summer to learning several operatic roles, not to enter opera but because he believes that a singer should be prepared.

***When the organist on the "Husbands and Wives" broadcast walked into the studio two minutes before

the program went on the air, Sedley Brown confided that he wished the man hadn't come at all. "For weeks I've been waiting for an opportunity to play that new electric organ," Brown said wistfully.

***Ernie Watson is known around Radio City as "the man who makes music talk." Professional folks are calling his musicians the "talking band." Ernie waves the baton over Joe Cook's Variety Show on Saturday nights at NBC. Every week he writes a novelty number or two for the show which makes the music tell a story.

***Francis White, soprano star of the Johnny Green show, has been selected as chairman of the Women's Committee for the first annual Western Horse Show.

***Shirley Lloyd's folks back home in Colorado have finally become reconciled to her choosing a professional career. After listening to her sing on the Sunday night show with Ozzie Nelson's orchestra all winter, they decided she must be a success. Up until recently they thought this singing business was pretty useless and were writing her once a week to give up radio.

***Carlton KaDehl, noted West Coast announcer, has decorated the basement in his Laurel Canyon home and is permitting neighborhood children to use it for amateur theatricals.

***Lou Silvers, musical director of the CBS Radio Theatre broadcasts, has been so busy for years that he has never gone to a photographer to have his picture taken. The only pictures of him in existence are action shots taken at rehearsal for the air show. In addition to his radio work, Silvers is musical director of a big Hollywood film studio and works about 15 hours daily.
