Below is a list showing classification and sections of the exhibit. Please read it carefully.

CLASSIFICATION
Section A
Class 1—Collection of six (6) Roses.

Class 2—Single Rose.
Class 3—Collection of six (6) Delphinium.

Class 4—Single Delphinium.
Section B
Class 1—Collection of long stemmed flowers not to exceed thirty (30) inches. Annuals or perennials.

Class 2—Collection of short stemmed flowers not to exceed twelve (12) inches.
Class 3—Lilies

Section C
Display of Oregon Wild Flowers.
Section D
Class 1—Best arrangements of flowers in a basket, bowl or vase.

Class 2—Old Fashioned Bouquet.
Section E
Best arrangement of flowers for dining table.

Section F
Most Unusual Flower Sweepstakes award. (cash)
First and second cash awards.

Bring your own containers and have them labeled with your name. Container counts on scoring.

ROYAL ROSARIANS TO JUDGE PARADE

The parade committee headed by Leonard Adams has been fortunate in obtaining the services of three prominent members of Portland's Royal Rosarians to judge our Festival Parade on Saturday June 19th.

These men are prominent in the civic and business life of Portland and as members of the Royal Rosarians for a number of years are qualified to judge our parade in its entirety.

Mr. George Koch, Past Prime Minister of the Royal Rosarians assisted by Howard Holman of the Privy Council of Royal Rosaria and Roscoe Segar, also of the Council have been selected to be Judges.

The committee in charge of the parade want it known that all outside communities are invited to participate in this parade and would appreciate each and every entry made. Entries can be made by a school, organization or an individual. Upon formation of the parade all entries will be assigned to their classification and division and judged on this basis.

The Parade will assemble at 9:45, in front of the Ritz Theatre on Broadway. Judging of the entries will start at 10:15 and the parade will move promptly at 10:45.

The line of march will be west on Broadway to Watson Street, south on Watson and west on Second to the High School grounds.

This year the parade will be divided into three sections. Section One will be divided into 4 Divisions, as follows:

Division 1—Ages 1 to 4
Division 2—Ages 5 to 7
Division 3—Ages 8 to 11
Division 4—Ages 12 to 14

Section Two will be composed of entries sponsored by grade school organizations with three or more children participating in each entry.

Section Three will consist of marching units, including bands, orchestras, drum corps, drill teams, and uniformed marching bodies.

Boys and girls up to and including fourteen years of age are eligible and all types of costumes, decorated wagons, buggies, cycles and other movable types of small vehicles may be entered.

More liberal selection of prizes will be offered for the various sections and divisions than previously. Animal pets may also be decorated as entries.
