ED JANNSEN IS ATTENDING JAMBOREE

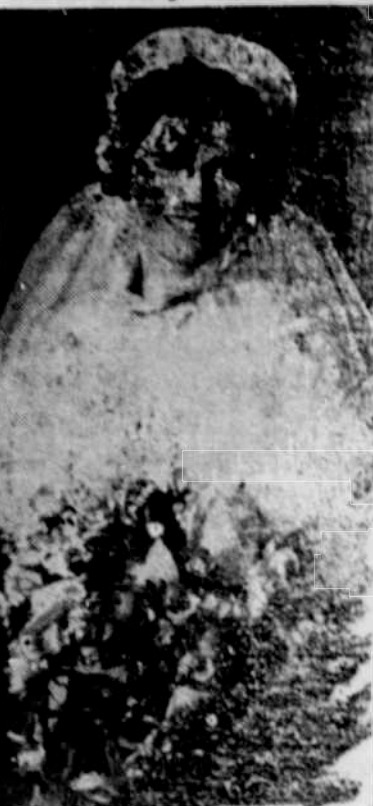
