New Foods To Try Through July AN HEIRLOOM RECIPE

Treasured for fifty years and handed down from mother to daughter is a delicious Date Pie. It's as easy as it's old. Here's the recipe:

50 Year Old Pie

1 package dates (pitted)
1 pint milk
2 eggs
Salt
Pastry shell
Put dates in a double boiler with the milk. Cook until mushy, then strain through a wire sieve. Beat in egg yolks and fill an uncooked pastry shell. Bake as you would pumpkin pie, and use the egg whites for a meringue to top baked pie. Brown lightly in the oven.

FIVE KINDS IN ONE IS NEW ICE BOX CAKE!

Puddings, cookies, fruit, fruit juice, custard and gelatine—whee! They're all tucked in the newest and tastiest of all ice box cakes! It's a dessert you'll want to have on the most special occasions, and it pleases everybody because it's made with the all 'round banana (no pun!) For that meal you want to be just perfect, save and try this newest member of the ice box cake family:

Banana-Orange Ice Box Cake
1 tbs. granulated gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1 1/4 cups milk
1 tbs. cornstarch
2/3 cup sugar
1/4 tbs. salt
1 egg, well beaten
2 tbs. butter
1/3 cup orange juice
2 tbs. lemon juice
1 tbs. grated orange rind
1 tbs. grated lemon rind
4 ripe bananas
3/4 cup cookie crumbs
Sprinkle gelatin over cold water and let stand until softened. Scald milk over hot water. Mix together cornstarch, sugar and salt and stir into hot milk. Cook 10 minutes stirring frequently.

Stir a little of the hot milk mixture into the beaten egg, then add this to the remaining hot mixture. Cook about 2 minutes longer or until mixture is thickened. Remove from heat and add gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Add butter, fruit juice and rind. Cool. Line bottom and sides of dish (7 x 19 x 2 inches) with lengthwise and crosswise strips of waxed paper, cut to extend beyond edges of dish. Slice half of the banana onto bottom of dish and sprinkle with 1/2 of the crumbs. Pour cooled custard mixture carefully over crumbs. Cover with remaining banana slices and top with crumbs. Chill in refrigerator for several hours. Decorate with whipped cream if desired. Six or eight servings.

SUMMER FUN, EH KIDS!

Home-made "lollies" are fun to "lick" and fun to make all on a summer's afternoon. This recipe is repeated here by request of a dozen mothers!

Lollipops

Put 2 cups sugar, 2-3 cup white corn syrup, and 1 cup water into a saucepan and stir over low fire until sugar is dissolved. Cook without stirring until it is very brittle when tried in cold water (310°F.). (During cooking, wash down crystals from sides of pan with wet cloth.) Cook slowly at last part of the cooking. When done, remove from fire, add coloring as desired, and 1/2 teaspoon of oil peppermint. Drop from tablespoon onto oiled baking sheet. Press one end of skewer or toothpick into edge of each "pop". Loosen from baking sheet as soon as entirely cold.

Hints for Homemakers

FOR a punch that is easily made and is ideal for serving on hot afternoons, try the following recipe. Mix two cups canned unsweetened Hawaiian pineapple juice, one-half cup grape juice, one-half cup carbonated water. Add one slice of pineapple cut in shreds. When thoroughly mixed pour over crushed ice in glasses. Six servings.

When framing valuable etchings, water colors or prints which will remain in their frames for some time, it is suggested that they be backed with a sheet of pressed wood instead of the customary cardboard. If they are then sealed with gummed tape, changes in the humidity of the room cannot reach the drawing and they remain clean until taken out of the frame. If accidentally dropped, the pressed wood keeps the frame rigid in most cases and prevents the glass from breaking. Many costly works of art have been cut or torn by broken glass when the frame has been dropped on the floor.

Eye-Appeal and Eye-Comfort Combined In Charming Fireplace Setting



Floor lamps at divan and easy chair provide restful light for reading, while above the mantel, new-type wall urns add a charming decorative touch.

THE fireplace naturally commands first choice in the decorative treatment of the living room. Too often, unfortunately, its furnishings are designed more for eye-appeal than eye-comfort, with the result that one curling up in an easy chair or divan beside it cannot read without straining the eyes.

An interesting answer to the problem that I saw recently is shown in the accompanying illustration. At opposite sides of the fireplace, both the divan and easy chair have the new floor lamps that carry a glass diffusing bowl behind the shade, and equipped with the three-light bulb by which three different amounts of light may be obtained at successive turns of the switch. Thus, there's abundant light for reading, with lesser amounts available for conversation.

Do you notice the two little wall urns flanking the pictures just above

the mantel? They're quite new, and bid fair to become extremely popular. Their colors, by the way, are made to match the wall paper or paint. Open at the top, they send considerable light to the ceiling, to soften the general effect. At the bottoms, glass plates permit diffused light to reach the ivy plants and keep them healthy. Small round glass ornaments on the curved outer surface add a delightful decorative touch.

These little wall urns were installed to replace less attractive fixtures that were originally provided, and which are now stored away. When moving day rolls around, the old fixtures will be put back, and the new ones taken along.

There's a growing feeling among homemakers that lighting fixtures, which form such important parts of the decorative scheme, should be just as removable as the rest of the furnishings. Rather sensible, don't you think?

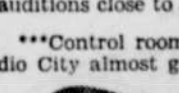
***Edgar Guest's new series, "It Can Be Done," has already brought additional offers to his maestro, Frankie Masters, but the bandman is sticking with the poet.

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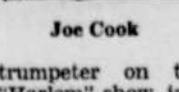

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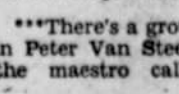
