The extent to which the so-called "college wickets" have replaced older varieties in major wheat growing sections of Oregon was apparent to any trained observers who traveled the Old Oregon Trail highway this year. From the top of Emigrant hill east of Pendleton, many thousands of acres of grain are visible. From that vantage point, before harvest, only three fields could be seen that did not have the brown chaff indicative of either Federation or Rex wheat. Federation was introduced from Australia by the Moro branch experiment station, while Rex wheat was actually bred and developed there.

Know Your Language

"FARTHER" and "further" are often used indiscriminately, even by writers of recognized standing. There is, however, a distinction. "Farther" denotes a greater distance between two points, as "Scranton is farther from New York than Philadelphia is." "Further" is properly used in the sense of "more in advance" or "additional," as "A further difficulty is certain to be encountered."

In verbs with the prefix "re-" the prefix itself signifies "again," "back," "anew." To say, therefore, "He returned back to his original starting place" is what grammarians call a pleonasm—the use of more than the necessary number of words. The sentence should read simply, "He returned to his original starting place."

M. H. H. Joachim, producer of "Your Unseen Friend," believes that middle-aged persons are easier to train for radio dramatic roles than youngsters.

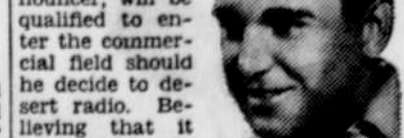
Only exception to the rule of "no studio audience" at the Werner Janssen Sunday night programs is
