URA LYRE'S OWN COLUMN

Well we have President Roosevelt among us this week. It was announced that he could not leave Washington while most important events were pending and needed solution; but suddenly after returning to the capital from a vacation at his rich man's New York home, called for show purposes his "fahm," he comes rushing to the Pacific Coast, and the Chinese-Japanese and European crises, to say nothing of domestic problems, such as strikes, et cetera, can go hang.

It is necessary for him to come out in this direction to look after badly shaken and "busted" political fences. Maybe he can smile and laugh off his stupendous blunders as he has often done in the past, but real democrats as well as republicans are getting fed up on his tremendous egotism, which has so little back of it. Then he attempts to run the government, and instead of drawing his help and advisors from dependable statesmen, business men and others of like caliber, he surrounds himself with a lot of inexperienced college professors, mere theorists, a brain storm trust, who have politely named themselves the "Brain Trust," leaving out the "storm," the most applicable portion of the appellation. They have attempted to borrow the country rich; following it up year after year, sending us deeper and deeper into the rack, until we soon will be gasping for breath; something no real business man with good sane judgment would do in his own affairs. We have not had a "New Deal" as has been claimed, but a "Raw Deal" for sure. We will have to pay with the sweat of our brows, or go bankrupt and repudiate.

In the meantime he is straining every effort to get more power to himself, and take away the people's rights, and liberties, even their courts of justice, by trying to make them subservient to his will and dictatorship. More about this later.
