Grasses Continue Outstanding
CANYON CITY—An inspection of the Wickup grass nursery and grazing plots late in August showed the same grasses continuing to give the best account of themselves, says County Agent R. E. Brooke. In the nursery plots these were, in order, smooth bromegrass, crested wheat grass, quack grass and slender wheat grass. In the grazing plots smooth bromegrass and quack grass continued to show their value for this purpose. The bunch grasses have more or less disappeared, except where the plots were opened to grazing late in the season, Brooke said.

Lime With Sweet Clover Pays

ROSEBURG—Results of planting sweet clover with lime, using a discarded grain drill, were seen recently on the farm of E. J. Crawford, when County Agent, J. R. Parker, H. A. Lindgren, extension livestock specialist, and a number of farmers

visited the farm plantings made in 1936 on the land where alfalfa had drowned out stood as high as a man's head and had a heavy growth of seed. A crop planted in 1937 on a hill slope farmed for several years to small cereals stood at 8 to 12 inches high with a good color at the time of inspection.

Gray's brilliant hurling arm carried the Orangemen to the stunning victory over Washington last week.

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SNAPSHOT GUILD

SPECIAL PICTURE HOBBIES



ONE of the attractions of the

hobby of amateur photography is that it provides an almost unlimited number of hobbies within the hobby; as many, in fact, as there are kinds of things that the eye can see. Ships, flowers, trees, clouds, locomotives, colonial architecture, historical monuments, gargoyles, machinery, babies, horses, dogs, cats, birds, insects are only a few subjects which have their devotees as special picture hobbies. Enthusiasm for photography combines with the collector's instinct, resulting in albums of photographs of the chosen subject that are a source of pride, pleasure and instruction.

In addition to the enjoyment of making the photographs, the value of a special picture hobby is that it usually leads to an accumulation of knowledge about the subject that is educational and broadening. If the photographer starts making pictures of flowers, he soon discovers that there are many things about flowers that he never knew before. He is likely to become quite a botanist. So with ships. He is likely soon to be studying up on marine architecture and enjoying it.

Above is an amateur photograph from the album of an insect specialist. This is a hobby which affords him the extra enjoyment of walking into the woods and fields in his hunts for specimens. He photographs them on the spot and captures them to take home for indoor shots. He has become an amateur entomologist. Now he really knows about "bees' knees," "butterflies'

eyebrows" and how many legs a caterpillar has. He finds that photographing insects in the open fields, garden or woods, is really a sport. Some kinds you can stick a stick fully but he tells you that, more often than you would suppose, you have success by lying in wait for an insect to come within lens range and pose itself on flower, leaf or twig on which you have focused. If you locate yourself in a place where there are plenty of them, it won't be long before one of the unflinching hops or flies into position in front of your waiting lens. Of course, if you do not have a close focusing bellows camera, you should use a portrait attachment in order to get a large image, and in either case you will usually need to have an enlargement made from the original print of the negative.

The exposure should usually be twice that given regular outdoor scenes with the same lens and conditions. Being close to the subject there is less light reflected, and detail is essential. It is better to double the exposure time, and also to use a small stop. Your camera should be stationary on a support. You must expect some failures because of the refusal of an insect to stay in position long enough for the required exposure, but that adds to the value of the successful picture.

Crawlers, beetles, bees, spiders and their webs, the praying mantis and the butterfly offer good opportunities; so does the "snap" itself, if you care to take a chance.
