SERVICE TO BE AVAILABLE SOON

The State Employment Service this week announced an itinerant service to enable eligible unemployed workers in small towns and rural districts to register for employment and file their claims for unemployment benefits at points near their homes.

This service will consist of a weekly visit by representatives of the State Employment Service to more than fifty towns of the State and will be continued for such time as local employment conditions seem to require.

Each person applying for unemployment benefits is required to register with the Employment Service for a job. If he has worked at an employment subject to the State Unemployment Compensation law is found eligible for benefits, he may draw weekly compensation after a waiting period of two weeks, providing suitable employment is not found for him in the meantime.

The schedule of towns, places and dates for Washington county is as follows: Hillsboro, Council Chamber, City Hall—Jan. 3, 5, 7; Forest Grove, Chamber of Commerce Building, Jan. 4, 6 and 8.

DECREASE SEEN IN TRAFFIC DEATHS

A remarkable decrease in highway deaths during the last quarter of 1937 was the highlight of traffic safety news for the year. Secretary of State Earl Snell declared in reviewing the highway picture for the past 12 months.

Other outstanding trends during the year were: A last quarter slump in traffic injuries paralleling the decrease in deaths.

A sustained increase in highway travel over 1936. Continued improvement of the accident reporting system.

Secretary Snell reports greatly expanded efforts by his office in the field of traffic safety, following authorization of the work by the last legislature.

Safety councils have been organized or are being organized in a number of Oregon communities, with the help of representatives from the secretary of state's office.

Safety movies have been shown in 71 Oregon high schools, and will be kept in circulation until they have been viewed by every high school student body in the state.

Radio programs, safety news stories and speeches prepared and presented by himself or by members of his staff would run into the hundreds, Snell declares.

Continuation of the present program and development of new channels of safety education are planned for 1938, he said. He is hopeful that with a comprehensive safety campaign carried on through the entire year Oregon will take its place as the "safest state in the union."

GROWERS TO HOLD MEET THURSDAY

Pea weevil control, particularly in the Austrian field pea seed crop, will be the topic of discussion at a meeting of pea growers set for Thursday afternoon, 1:30 p.m., January 13, in the county court room, courthouse, Hillsboro. Last year definite control was obtained in some cases by the proper application of rotenone dust, according to W. S. Cyrus, county agent. At this meeting next week J. W. Chamberlain, U. S. Department of Agriculture; Don C. Mote, head of the entomology department, Oregon State College; and Kenneth Gray, entomologist of the Oregon Station will be present to discuss pea weevil and their control and will have plans for constructing practical dusting equipment.

Growers the past season experienced more difficulty than usual in getting their field pea seed to meet the necessary requirements. Not all of this was due to weevil infestation but there is annually an appreciable loss of peas that have to be blown out because of weevil infestation. Some of the work to date indicates that much of this may possibly be eliminated. For the purposes of bringing these results to the attention of the growers together with the necessary practices in cutting down on the amount of infestation, this meeting is being held.
