Social security pays 1/2 of 1% up to \$3,000, 1-1/2 of 1% between \$3,000 and \$45,000, 1-24 of 1% in excess of \$45,000. Limit \$10 to \$85 monthly.

Before he is 65 years old: "A" earns \$6,600. 1/2 of 1% of \$3,000 \$15 1-1/2 of 1% of \$3,600 3 Monthly Pension \$18 "B" earns \$45,000. 1/2 of 1% of \$3,000 \$15 1-24 of 1% of \$42,000 35 Monthly Pension \$50 "C" earns \$69,000. 1/2 of 1% of \$3,000 \$15 1-12 of 1% of \$42,000 35 1-24 of 1% of \$24,000 10 Monthly Pension \$60

It will take 45 years before workers can earn enough money to get a supporting pension. They would have to work continuously at a place which has Social Security Tax.

We need a Townsend Pension to take care of the interim and unemployment. The Townsend pension has been modified. You can apply for any amount under \$200 that you can easily spend. You can remain in business after you are sixty years old without taking the pension, if you so desire.

We need a Townsend pension, so old people can move from State to State without losing their pension. A man, 84 years old and getting blind, is living in the dust bowl. He has turned his property over to the State. If he leaves the State he loses his pension and his property. His people have moved away to get a living. He is alone.

The license fees for licensable dogs over the age of eight months and for such dogs owned or kept within the State of Oregon over 30 days for the year 1938 are:

MALE DOG: \$1.00
Female Dog: \$1.50
Spayed Female Dog \$1.00

After March 1st, 1938, the license fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure license for the dogs above stated.

Also, after March 1st, 1938 the fee is \$1.00 more for failure to procure licenses for licensable dogs becoming over 8 months of age after March 1st, 1938, and for dogs over eight months old owned or kept within the State of Oregon over 30 days after March 1st, 1938.

Licenses may be ordered by mail.
