NEW CHARGE IN AUTO DEATH CASE

The arrest last Friday of a seventeen year old Portland girl on a charge of perjury has brought new developments in the Wilford Davis manslaughter case according to G. Russel Morgan, county district attorney.

Named in a grand jury indictment the girl is accused of having given false testimony before and earlier grand jury investigation into the death of Ralph Prah, 38, of Hillsboro, more than a year ago.

Wilford Davis, charged with manslaughter growing out of the traffic death of Prah, this week pleaded guilty, but on appearing in circuit court for sentencing named the Portland girl as having been at the wheel of the car when his vehicle struck Prah on the Dairy Creek bridge.

Davis added that he was assisting the girl to drive, the district attorney said. Resentencing of Davis is scheduled for Saturday before Circuit Judge R. F. Peters.

The grand jury's list of true bills totaled seven, including one secret charge.

Torvald Branda of Gaston was named in two counts, one charging drunk driving and the other for failing to stop at the scene of an accident. He is accused of having struck and injured Joe Smith, CCC boy at Forest Grove. Bud Williams and Gerald McAdams face charges of selling liquor to a minor, and J. B. Webster was indicted on a charge of larceny by bailment.

Canadian Wild Rye Excels

PENDLETON—Canadian wild rye grass produced a stand unexcelled by any other grass among the 1937 seedlings in the Ukiah forage nursery, reports County Agent W. A. Holt. Beardless blue bunch wheatgrass also showed excellent stand and development when observed late this fall, and blue bunch wheatgrass also showed well, having made about half the growth of the beardless variety, Holt said. English rye grass made a better than average stand and was green quite late, considering the elevation. Other grasses making good showings were blue wild rye, meadow fescue, orchard grass and slender wheat. Of the older plantings, made about 1923 crested wheat grass continued to lead in general excellence he said.

Mail'ur to Grow More Beets

ONTARIO—In spite of a decrease in the average yield of sugar beets this year, attributed to a heavy infestation of leaf hoppers in July and August, growers feel that this condition is not likely to recur, and there is every indication that the acreage will increase materially in 1938, probably running as high as 12,000 to 15,000 acres, reports R. G. Larson, county agent. The Amalgamated Sugar company has announced plans to start work soon on a refinery just east of Nyssa.

NUMBER OF ACCIDENTS INCREASE

For the first time in more than two and a half years, Oregon automobile accidents have taken a downward dip. Secretary of State Earl Snell, announced this week. A definite decrease in fatalities has been shown for several months, but the number of accidents continued on an upward trend.

December with about 3800 accidents reported, was nearly 250 accidents below December 1936, Snell said.

While there have been seasonal fluctuations from time to time, Snell said that until December every month since May, 1935 had shown more accidents than the corresponding month during the previous year.

"This is the best news we have had since the state first began to make headway against the highway death toll several months ago," Snell declared. "It gives us some basis for hope that 1938 will show fewer deaths, fewer injuries and fewer accidents than 1937. Marked decreases in all three will be our goal this year."

Snell pointed out that accidents cost every man, woman and child in Oregon approximately \$17 last year. He said that this economic drain cuts deeply into the wealth of that state every year, and that every feasible step must be taken to halt it.

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DEAN ALLEN HONORED AT MEET

Newspapermen, among whom were scores of his former students, joined to pay tribute to the 25 years of service of Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism at the University of Oregon, at the final session of the 20th annual Oregon Press Press Conference held January 20, 21 and 22 on the University campus.

Those who sounded praises to the dean, who for a quarter of a century has by example and teaching instructed men and women now in journalism in every part of the world, included Governor Charles H. Martin; W. W. Loomis, La Grange, Ill., president of the National Editorial Association; Mr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education; Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, president of the university; Dr. Donald M. Erb, newly elected university head; Alton F. Baker, president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association; and George Stanley Turnbull, professor of journalism.

Members of the university chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, which is also in its 25th year, presented the dean with a gold watch, chain and fraternity key. With the gift went a volume of 125 letters, written by the dean's former students and others who admire his career and accomplishments.

"A free press is the keystone of democracy, and to your efforts in this great cause, I want to say 'well done,'" Governor Martin declared in his address honoring Dean Allen. Chancellor Hunter pointed to Oregon as a state marked by fine journalism, and for this credit should be given Dean Allen, he said. A warm, personal insight into the dean's character was given in an intimate way by Professor Turnbull, whose service here nearly equals that of the journalism school head.
