Unusual Salads, Desserts, Tempt Jaded Appetites By BETTY BARCLAY

Salads

Piquant salads are easily obtained by combining tangy flavors to stuff fresh Anjou pear halves. Peel and halve them, hollow the center, and fill with any of the following: crab meat and French dressing; currant or mint jelly; cottage cheese topped with marsh-mallows; chutney; Roquefort cream cheese; Philadelphia or pimento cream cheese; or a mixture of cream cheese, to which mixture add chopped nut meats; anchovy paste; chopped green pepper; chopped stuffed olives; chopped celery; pulverized ginger snaps; Onion salt, celery salt, paprika and lemon juice give a dash of flavor. If mayonnaise is used, beat in a little cream or whipped cream. If pears are properly ripe, the flesh will yield to gentle pressure of your thumb; if not ripe, keep in open air in kitchen until ripe, even if it requires several days, as increased juiciness and flavor is worth the wait. If pears are peeled very much in advance of the meal, squeeze lemon or orange juice on them to preserve whiteness.

Flavorful Baked Apples



In baking apples, select Doc Apple quality, and bake in baking dish (not tin). Wash and core apples, place in baking dish and fill core cavities with any of the following: sugar (white or brown), combine butter with cinnamon, nutmeg, grated lemon peel, or ground almonds; raisins or dates, sugar and grated lemon peel; apricot or strawberry jam; jelly; marmalade; chopped preserved ginger; chopped marshmallows topped with butter. Surround apples with syrup made of sugar and water flavored with lemon juice, or melted cinnamon candies; or syrup made of one cup maple sugar and 1½ cup water and 1 T. sugar. Bake in slow oven until tender, basting sufficiently. Serve hot or cold in own syrup with cream or whipped cream. It is suggested a glass baking dish be used and dessert served at the table, to stimulate appetites.

ANOTHER BIG DAY

In addition to our First President's birthday, February 22nd is also famous as the date on which the State of Florida was ceded to the United States by Spain (that was about 118 years ago). That makes those luscious oranges and grapefruit and tangerines just the thing to serve on the big day—you can alkalize as you appetize!

Foods for which Virginia is famous are rightly served on our First President's day too. Ham, for instance, is not only traditional but it's plentiful and delicious this month, so build your Washington day menu around it!

February 22nd Menu

Grapefruit, Palm Beach Style
Broiled Ham
Yams
Broiled Bananas
Cooked Mixed Greens
Gingerbread with Frozen Applesauce

Grapefruit, Palm Beach Style
This is a new and novel way to prepare grapefruit—pretty as a picture! Select firm grapefruit; cut in halves and loosen segments. With a sharp knife cut small gashes in grapefruit skin at regular intervals around rim of grapefruit half. Insert small green leaves (mint, huckleberry, or other leaves) in the slots. To serve mix together (for each serving a few drops Worcester-hire sauce, table-spoon salal oil, salt pepper and paprika. Pour over grapefruit. Serve as salad-appetizer.

Broiled Ham and Bananas

Virginia Style
Broil or fry slice of ham. Peel bananas. Use whole, or cut into quarters. Place on broiler rack or in pan. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with salt. Broil until bananas are brown and tender. Allow 10 minutes for whole banana or crosswise halves. Allow 3 to 5 minutes for quarters or lengthwise halves. Serve very hot with ham.

Frozen Apple Sauce

2 cups apple sauce
Juice of ½ lemon
¼ cup sweetened condensed milk
Nutmeg (optional)
Add the juice of ½ lemon to 2 cups apple sauce. Add mixture to ¼ cup sweetened condensed milk and blend thoroughly. Nutmeg may be added if desired. Serve ice cold. Serves 6.

Banana Bundles

¼ cup sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
6 bananas
Juice 1 lemon
Rich pastry (made with 2½ cups flour)
Mix sugar and cinnamon. Peel and cut bananas in halves, crosswise. Roll in lemon juice, then in sugar-cinnamon mixture. Place on a square of pie crust about ¼ inch thick and roll, so that

pie crust encloses banana. Bake in hot oven for 30 minutes or until browned. Serve hot with hard sauce or sweetened whipped cream. 6 servings.

On Oregon Farms

Pea Weevil Control Viewed

HILLSBORO—Success of roten-one dust in controlling pea weevil in canneries in this district the past year has pointed the way toward control of this insect in Austrian field pea seed plantings, believe state college and federal entomologists who were in charge of the successful campaign. Cost of dusting last season averaged \$4.95 per acre for two dustings, including materials, labor and incidentals. It is believed that the weevil could be controlled in seed pea fields with less complete coverage, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus.

Guineas May Protect Turkeys

CORVALLIS — The plan of raising a few guineas in a turkey flock to sound alarm in the event of anyone disturbing the flock during the night is endorsed by H. E. Cosby, head of the poultry department at Oregon State college. He says there is no particular danger in brooding normal healthy guineas hatched from disease free parent stock right along with the poult. It is important however to see that they do come from healthy stock. Cosby also recommends tattooing each turkey as a further precaution against theft.

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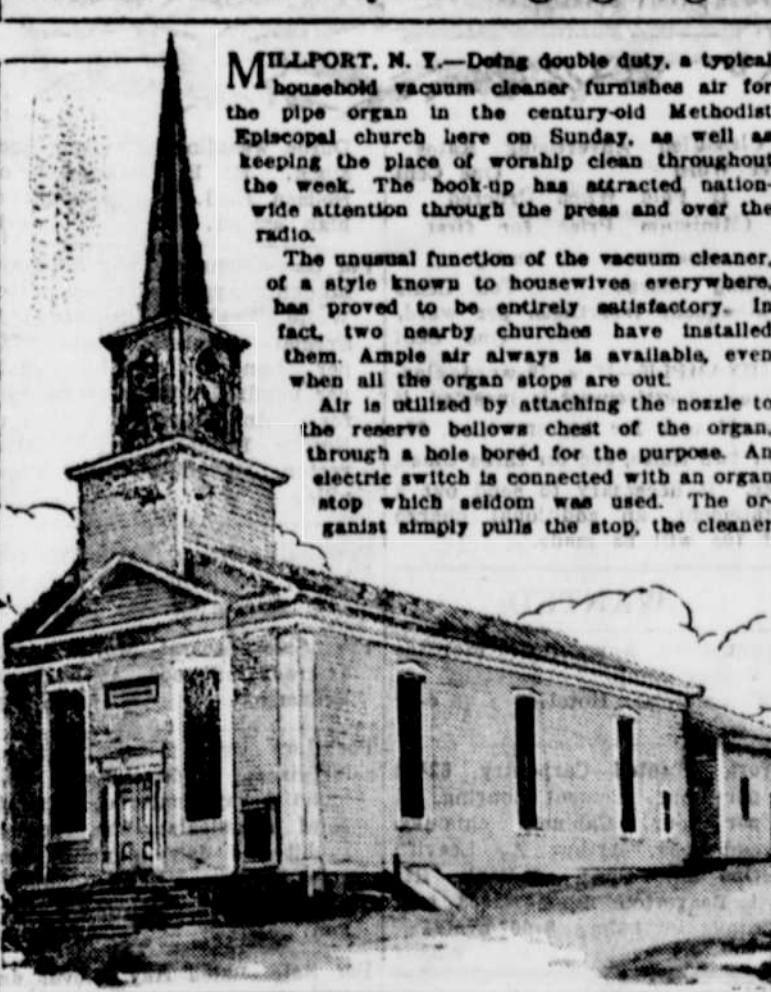


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Weekday Cleaner Turns Organ Aid When Sabbath Hymn Singing Begins



MILLFORD, N. Y.—Doing double duty, a typical household vacuum cleaner furnishes air for the pipe organ in the century-old Methodist Episcopal church here on Sunday, as well as keeping the place of worship clean throughout the week. The book-up has attracted nationwide attention through the press and over the radio.

The unusual function of the vacuum cleaner, of a style known to housewives everywhere, has proved to be entirely satisfactory. In fact, two nearby churches have installed them. Ample air always is available, even when all the organ stops are out.

Air is utilized by attaching the nozzle to the reserve bellows chest of the organ, through a hole bored for the purpose. An electric switch is connected with an organ stop which seldom was used. The organist simply pulls the stop, the cleaner

starts its powerful but quiet whirling, and presto, the bellows fills, and the music peals forth in response to the musician's touch on the keys.

The tube of the vacuum cleaner is attached to the blowing end of the machine when it doubles for the former organ pump-boy. When

the story of the organ and vacuum cleaner was broadcast from Radio City, the suction end of the cleaner was used, for the organ heard on the coast-to-coast hook-up was a small studio reed organ, whose bellows is filled by suction, rather than by blowing, as in the case of pipe organs.
