TAXPAYERS CATECHISM

Question: Assuming that I belong to that party, or sect, who believe in and advocate the theory of "slowly taxed out so that it may easily be confiscated for the use of all the people," what opportunities does the proposed Seven County Utility District offer to have my wishes gratified?

Answer: Many.

Question: Name some of them.

Answer: Property can be taxed for building electric light systems and irrigation canals; paying bonded indebtedness and interest thereof; costs of special election; salaries of directors; operating and maintenance costs including deficits and losses occasioned by mistakes of directors. Property can also be taxed for building lines and extensions in the other counties. In fact Washington County, the richest of the seven and practically debt free will be the rich juicy plum to be picked by the other less fortunate counties.

Question: If obligation bonds are issued, and one or more counties default in the payment of their bonds, can I be taxed to make up this loss?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Can the directors incur indebtedness without my consent?

Answer: Yes, up to the full amount of the earnings of the district each year, which the Hydro-Electric Commission estimates at over two million dollars.

Question: Once I have voted myself into this district can I get out?

Answer: If you live in the country, no. If in an incorporated city, yes.

Question: Can Washington County vote itself out of the district?

Answer: At the coming election, April 8 they can. If Washington County votes to go into the district it must remain in and cannot vote itself out later.

FACTS FOR DRIVERS

Should my better pair of tires be carried on the front or rear wheels?

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

PICTURES WITH WEAK LIGHT



Hard to take? No! A box camera gets it with a 4-second exposure. Cameras, 1 second at f.6.3. Exposure is short because the light is near face.

IT IS surprising how little light is needed to make a picture if the light is placed close to the subject. For instance, look at the snapshot above. The only light is the weak little electric candle lamp, held about a foot from the child's face.

With the lamp at that distance, a box camera loaded with supersensitive film can get the picture with a four-second time exposure. Lamp two feet from her, exposure would be sixteen seconds—four times as long. Lamp three feet away, exposure is thirty-six seconds—nine times as long.

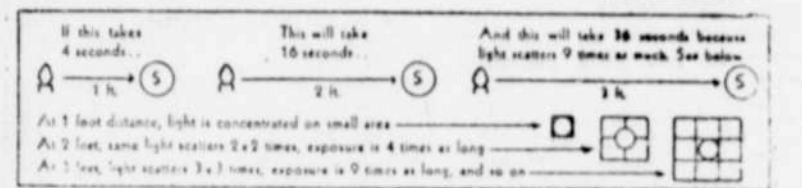
Reason: When light is close up, it

is concentrated on a small area. Farther away, the same amount of light spreads over a much larger area. Your subject gets very little of it.

The distance between the lamp and the camera doesn't matter, but the distance from light to subject that counts.

To take a picture like the one above, use a frosted white bulb, and have it as near the center of the picture as possible. Such pictures are worth trying. Sometimes you miss—but the good ones you get are so unusual that they justify your experiments.

The nearer the light to subject, the less exposure required. (Distance from camera to subject doesn't matter.) If your indoor pictures are coming out too dark, try using more light, have bulbs closer to subject, or give longer exposures.
