Interesting Talk Given By Mrs. Silva In Native Costume

Chinese Hand Work, Shoes, Etc. Shown By Mrs. Silva

Members and friends of the Christian Church enjoyed last Thursday evening with Mrs. Locke Silva, Free Methodist Missionary of 14 years to the great plains of China, as guest speaker. Mrs. Silva prepared a large quantity of "chow-see," a Chinese hash, for the pot luck dinner and demonstrated the proper use of chopsticks with the dish. A few native recipes were given.

After dinner, in her native dress, Mrs. Silva showed lesson charts and told the story each represented. Lovely Chinese hand work was exhibited. Little shoes and good luck pieces made by refugees staying in their compound were distributed, at a small price for souvenirs.

A hymn written by a native Christian was read, then sung in Chinese by Mrs. Silva.

Rev. George Hatch read brotherhood letters from neighboring Christian Churches. Brother G. H. H. offered a prayer and Mrs. Virgil Myers a missionary reading.

STUDENTS HEED SAGE ADVISE GIVEN

Nearly all of those who started testing some few years ago are continuing, believing from their experience in their own herd that the dairy herd improvement testing more than justifies the expense. From such testing and record work the herd owner obtains a complete record of the milk and butterfat production of each individual cow together with the feed cost of producing the same. These records are made up month by month and entered in each herd owner's herd book by the tester at the time he visits the farm once a month when he weighs and tests the milk and checks the feed.

Dairy-men who are testing report that the data gained in this way determines their feeding and breeding program and gives them a record of the production of individual animals and of the progeny of both dams and sires. Such information is of first importance to the owner in determining his improvement program and in listing production of individuals and strains so that he has a production record when prospective buyers are around looking for dairy stock.

ASSOCIATION OPERATED THREE YEARS

For three years a dairy herd improvement association comprised entirely of Washington county herds has been in operation. This followed some three or four years of testing in cooperation with herd owners in other counties. At the present time 23 herd owners in addition to those who have been testing have signed agreements asking that their herds be tested as soon as another tester could be hired to take care of the work, according to W. F. Cyrus, co. agent. These 23 herds make up approximately 17 days of work. For a full time month approximately 25 days are needed. This additional time can be filled up with herds from an adjacent county. Local dairymen want to keep it open as long as possible to give herd owners here a chance to use this time.

St. Mary's Track Season Is Opened

Interclass Track Meet Formally Opens Season For Saints

Juniors Win Meet By Margin Of Eleven Points

The St. Mary's track season opened formally Sunday, with the holding of the interclass meet, with fifteen men competing for the prizes awarded by the school. The Juniors won with 40 points, followed by the freshmen with 29. Oscar Reynolds beat out Ladd Parapid by one-half point in collecting three firsts, in the field events, and second in the shot put, for a total of 20 points, having also placed in the dashes. Ladd Parapid won the shot put, getting also two seconds and two thirds. Alton won the high jump and tied for first in the pole vault. He beat out Kingsley for third place in the shot put. The Ezell brothers won the dashes, Curtis winning the 100 in fast time and Robert winning the 220. After Curtis had led the way to the tape, Curtis took second place in the 220, and Parapid took second in the 100 beating out R. Ezell by a half a stride. Virgil DePerio saved the seniors from a shut out, when on his last throw, in the discus he beat out Parapid for second place.

Sauser, a freshman won second place in the high jump and took third in both the broad jump and pole vault. Although the day was cold and the relay was finished in a blinding rain, there were lots of thrills and all the students were out for all events. Father Maxwell was field judge, Father Carberry, the track mentor acted as starter with Mr. Piestehman as official scorer. Hayes, Constanzo and Coleman acted as timers and judges.

BOY SCOUT CIRCUS TO BE IN MAY

With the executive committee selected and preliminary organization completed, the approximately 6,000 Boy Scouts and Cubs in the Portland Area Council have started working on the 1938 Boy Scout circus which will be held in the open air in Multnomah civic stadium, Portland, Saturday night, May 7 according to Harry W. Aldrich, Portland lumberman who has been named chairman in charge by C. C. Colt, president of the council.

Field Executive Paul H. Year-out has been chosen to handle the actual details and he has a corps of more than 75 assistants in key positions to assist him. A goal of at least 20,000 spectators has been set and with troops representing 10 counties in Oregon and five in southwestern Washington, coming to the Rose City for the big occasion, those in charge are confident the 10-act program will eclipse anything ever attempted by the Boy Scouts in this section.

The tentative program has been divided into three sections with the grand entry parade and massing of colors in which every Scout and Cub will participate, as Part 1. The second section will include signalling actions with the beating of tom toms and ending with a mass signal drill; horse and rider tourney, first aid demonstrations with its spectacle of a rescue from a burning ship; hundreds of "animals" and clowns by the scores; sea scouting and a chariot race said to be the envy of Ben Hur himself. Then section three will comprise covered wagons, horsemen, pioneers, mounted troops, explorers, pack trains demonstrations of the diamond hitch, camps and other features. In fact, there will be no dull moments from 8 p.m. to 10:40 p.m.

There are approximately 230 troops and 15 packs of Cubs, the latter ranging in ages from 9 to 11 years, in Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington Yamhill, Sherman, Hood River, Tillamook and Wasco counties in Oregon and Clark, Skamania, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, and Western Klickitat counties in Washington. All are expected to be in Portland on the night of May 7.

Tax Base Increased For Current Year

Total Assessed Valuation Above 1937, Below 1936 Level

Report Issued By Bureau Of Municipal Research At U. Of O.

The tax base of Oregon cities, taken as a whole, increased for the current year over the past year for the first time since 1931, a report just issued by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon shows.

Although this total assessed valuation for 1938 is above that of 1937, it is still below that of 1936 and previous years, the report states.

The figures given in the report for Beaverton are as follows: population, 1,138; assessed valuation of 1937 for 1938, \$512,996; city tax levy for 1938 in mills, 21.7; amount of city tax, \$11,132.02; per capita city tax, \$9.78; county assessment ratio, 50 per cent; assessed valuation on 50 per cent basis, \$493,265; assessed value per capita on 50 per cent basis, \$433; city tax rate in mills on 50 per cent basis, 22.57.

Nine incorporated cities, all but one, Fossil, under 500 population, will get through the year with no city tax levy at all. The other eight are Astoria, Cornucopia, Granite, Jun-tura, Lonerock, Mitchell, Orenco and Shaniko.
