



Here Are Hunches For Lunches

Don't say "luncheon" to be elegant; it's correct to say "lunch" according to Emily Post who broadcasts etiquette instructions. Luncheon (oops, lunch!) covers a multitude of virtues. There's the quick snack busy homemakers snatch at noon; the box lunch children carry; the noontime party; and the between meal lunch grandma called "a piece." The lunch problem arises 365 times a year! You be the judge of what the occasion demands — how much, how little, how good! Let these menus and suggestions help on planning:

Norse Grill For Lunch Spread hot toasted slices of rye bread with butter and prepared mustard. Top with a slice of Swiss cheese or snappy American cheese. Arrange smoked sardines on the cheese. Season with a sprinkling of vinegar and pepper. Grill until cheese begins to melt and sardines show little crackly curls of skin.

Fruit Snacks (Between Meal Cookies) 2 1/2 cups flour 1/4 teasp. salt 2 teasp. baking powder 1/2 teasp. cinnamon 1/2 pkg. dates, sliced 1/2 cup shortening 1 cup brown sugar 1 egg 1/2 squares, chocolate melted 1/2 cup milk Sift flour, salt, baking powder and cinnamon. Work in the dates (pitted and sliced) with the finger tips. Add the sugar gradually to the creamed shortening, then the beaten egg and the melted chocolate. Add dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Drop the mixture by rounded teaspoonfuls two inches apart on a well oiled baking sheet or inverted pan. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) for 10 to 15 minutes. Makes about 35 cookies.

Tropical Chicken Salad 3 ripe bananas, sliced 1/2 cup diced canned pineapple 1 1/2 cups diced cooked chicken 1/4 cup diced celery 1/4 teasp. salt Mayonnaise to moisten Mix bananas and pineapple together. (Pineapple prevents discoloration of bananas.) Add other ingredients and mix well. Ser-

on crisp lettuce leaves. Garnish if desired with chopped nuts and additional mayonnaise. Serves 6 to 8.

WAFFLES DE LUXE Waffles and pancakes are always delicious for a quick lunch. Serve them with jam or corn syrup and plenty of butter. Tea or coffee, and bacon curls or little pig sausages, and your menu is complete.

Waffles Supreme 2 eggs 1 1/2 cups milk 3-4 cup all-bran 1 1/2 cups flour 4 teasp. baking powder 1 teasp. salt 2 tbsps. sugar 1/2 cup melted fat Separate eggs. Beat yolks well; add milk and all bran; let soak until most of the moisture is taken up. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and sugar. Add sifted dry ingredients to liquid mixture and stir only until flour disappears. Add melted and cooled fat. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in hot waffle iron until no steam is visible. Yield: 12 waffles 5 1/2 inches in diameter.

Whole Meal Fruit Pie 2 grapefruit 2 oranges 4 slices pineapple French dressing 8 ripe olives 1 pkg. cream cheese Horseradish Lettuce Place a slice of canned pineapple on each individual plate. Segment firm grapefruit. On the pineapple, arrange alternately half sections of grapefruit and orange, using three of each. Between these sections place crescent shaped pieces of ripe olives. In the center place a ball of cream cheese an inch in diameter. Serve with French dressing, to which horseradish has been added. Garnish with lettuce leaves. 4 servings.

Lunch Bake 2 cups pea beans 1/4 teasp. soda 1/2 teasp. salt 1/4 teasp. pepper 1/2 teasp. dry mustard 1 small onion, peeled 1/2 cup dark corn syrup 2 oz. piece salt pork

Wash the beans and soak overnight in cold water. In the morning add soda and cook the beans until skins begin to loosen. Place one-half the salt pork, sliced in the bottom of the bean pot; add one-half the beans and half the seasonings; add remaining beans and seasonings; bury the onion in the beans. Drizzle the corn syrup over top, cover with salt pork. Add enough boiling water slowly so it seeps through the beans to the top. Do not use too much. Cover and bake in slow oven for four hours or longer, until liquid is absorbed and beans are dark and mealy. Recipe fills a two quart bean pot or covered casserole.

Easter Vacation Dishes



By BETTY BARCLAY Although the Easter holidays may not call for the elaborate meals of Thanksgiving and Christmas, they do demand that women be prepared for an emergency. Children are home from school or college; friends pay an Easter visit. Novel breakfast, luncheon and dinner dishes are eagerly sought by the perfect hostess. Here are a few suggestions:

Brazil Nut Apricot Bread For Easter Breakfast 1/2 cup dried apricots 1 egg 1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons melted butter 2 cups flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon soda 1/2 cup orange juice 1/4 cup water 1 cup chopped Brazil nuts 1/2 teaspoon salt Soak apricots 1/2 hour. Drain and grind. Beat egg until stiff, stir in sugar and mix well. Stir in butter, 2/3 cup flour with baking powder, salt and soda, and add alternately with orange juice and water. Add liquid last and apricots and mix well. Pour batter into well greased loaf pan and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) one and one-quarter hours.

Lamb Chops With Orange (Serves 6) 6 lamb, veal or pork chops Melted butter Sliced novel oranges Salt, pepper and paprika Trim fat from thick chops and fry in melted butter. Oil broiler and broil chops 8 minutes. Turn and place a thick slice of seeded orange on each chop. Broil 1 or 2 minutes longer. Sprinkle continuously with the seasonings. Serve hot.

pieces sponge cake (leftover cake may be used) A few thin slices fresh or canned peaches Place the pieces of cake in the bottom of the dessert dishes. Put two or three slices of the canned or fresh peaches over the top of each piece of cake. Dissolve rennet powder in lukewarm milk. Pour over pieces of cake and peaches and let set until firm—about 10 minutes. Chill in refrigerator.

Apricot Ice Cream (Automatic Refrigerator Method) 1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk 2 cups water 1/4 pound dried apricots 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract 1 cup whipping cream Cook apricots in 1 cup water until tender. Blend together sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup water and 1/4 cup liquid drained from apricots. Chop apricots and add with lemon extract to condensed milk mixture. Chill. Whip cream to custard-like consistency and fold into chilled mixture. Pour mixture into freezing pan. Place in freezing unit. After mixture is about half frozen remove from refrigerator. Scrape mixture from sides and bottom of pan. Beat until smooth but not until melted. Smooth out and replace in freezing unit until frozen for serving. Serves 6.

Canned Chopped Foods For Toddlers The food chopper is no longer a symbol of drudgery for mothers of the toddler set. Uniform chopped foods which doctors usually prescribe for children between one and four are now available in cans just as strained baby foods are. Among the chopped foods in cans now featured for toddlers' diets are carrots, spinach, beets, green beans, apple sauce and prunes. A vegetable soup with a wheat embryo content as well as chopped vegetables and a liver soup are also featured.

The State Hydroelectric Commission, of which George W. Joseph, Jr., is chairman, made a thorough investigation of the cost and problems of the 7-County Utility District to be voted upon at the April 8 special election. If the District paid taxes, it would lose \$12,729 a year for the first four years, and \$130,134 a year for the next 26 years the Commission reported. And what about the DISTRICT'S RATES? "The project does not hold forth a prospect for a reduction of rates for electricity until the amount of energy consumed is substantially increased or until the indebtedness (\$6,000,000) is retired," the Hydro-electric Commission said. SHALL WE LET DEBT AND TAXES ABSORB BONNEVILLE'S BENEFITS? This 7-County scheme, with its costly power lines to Yachets and Cannon Beach, would be a weight on our backs for 30 years, and then might never do us any good. Why isn't is good common sense to wait until Bonneville rates have been established and lines built by the government before we move from our present strategic position? Bonneville power will be sold to private companies on the same terms as to utility districts. Let the other six counties get out on a limb if they want to.
