Power Candidate

TREK TO OREGON STILL GOING ON

The trek to Oregon from other states, beginning back in the covered wagon days, continues every year, but today citizens of this state are faced with a real and immediate problem of what to do with these "pioneers." It is graphically pointed out in the latest reports issued by the Oregon State Planning Board, "A Study of Migration into Oregon, 1930-37." The report has been submitted to Governor Martin who has approved it for release to the public.

The report, which was prepared by V. B. Stanberry, planning board consultant and executive secretary, with assistance of the W.P.A. show that Oregon had a net gain of approximately 96,600 in population in the seven year period ending January 1, 1937, and of these but 15,100 were the result of natural growth of excess of births over deaths.

The wave of recent immigration reached a new peak in 1935 and 1936, the report shows. In five years from 1930 to 1935 the yearly increase was 8,063, but this rose to an average of 28,166 per year during 1935 and 1936.

"These newcomers have great difficulty in finding employment or land on which they can make a living. Social problem must be faced when migrants fail to make satisfactory personal adjustments. Manufacturing activities in Oregon are notably deficient and inadequate industrial development precludes absorption of any considerable number of migrant workers."

Establishment of basic industries, especially those requiring large blocks of power, greater development of lands through irrigation, flood control and clearing, and a problem of public works are recommended as aids in improving the lot of people moving into this state.

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GOVERNOR MARTIN And Tax Reduction

When a candidate for Governor four years ago, Charles H. Martin nailed the following plank to his platform.

"Tax Reduction Through Administrative Reforms and Retirement of the State's Bonded Debt"

Today the Governor can point to an achievement of those ends—and in spite of the cost of constructing a new State Capitol.

His budgetary control Act has made balanced budgets possible, enabled him to turn an inherited deficit of \$1,300,000 into a surplus of \$500,000 and relieve real property of taxation for State purposes.

To the Voters of the Proposed Northwest Oregon Bonneville People's Utility District:

TO PRESERVE YOUR PRESENT UTILITY TAXES AND TO AVOID HIGHER TAXATION ON YOUR OWN PROPERTY, WE URGE YOU TO VOTE AT THE SPECIAL ELECTION ON APRIL 8TH

Opposition to creation of the proposed Seven County District can be effective only by taking the time necessary to visit the polls on April 8th.

If the Seven County District is formed, the Bonneville Administrator will not construct any distribution lines to carry Bonneville energy to the consumers. All such distribution systems must be built or purchased by the utility district.

Power of the Bonneville Administrator is limited to selling the output of Bonneville at wholesale only.

The Federal Government may build high voltage transmission lines to various districts for sale of energy at wholesale only.

As indicative of the burden to which your property may be subjected, note the following provisions of the law under which public utility districts may be formed:

"The People's Utility District herein provided for shall have power ... to borrow money and incur indebtedness, to issue, sell and assume evidences of indebtedness, etc.

"To levy and collect, or cause to be levied and collected, subject to constitutional limitations, taxes for the purpose of carrying on the operations and paying the obligations of the district."

Without a vote of the people the directors would have power to incur indebtedness not exceeding the gross annual revenue of the district, estimated by the Hydro Electric Commission at more than \$2,000,000.

With voters' approval the directors, under the law, may issue general lien bonds on all property in the district not exceeding 10% of the assessed valuation of the property therein. This, at present, means a possible bonding power of \$10,000,000.

Do not be misled. Avoid higher taxes and more bonded debt.
