Crimson Clover Finding Favor
OREGON CITY—That crimson clover has made a place for itself in the agriculture of Clackamas county is shown in records of the Soil Conservation service, which indicate that more than 1,000 acres of this relatively new crop were planted in the county last year. Typical of the experiences of farmers trying this crop is that of Edward Shearer of Springwater, says County Agent J. J. Inskeep. His land is rather acid and he has had difficulty getting a stand of other legumes. Last July he sowed 11 acres of crimson clover, which furnished fall pasture and has furnished pasture for his dairy herd since the first week in January this year. His feed bill is cut in half and his cows give twice as much milk as usual at this time of year he says.

Shell Mounds Lime Source
GOLD BEACH—Analyses of CEDAR MILLS show all shell mound material in Curry county recently showed one sample submitted by J. W. Isenbaker to be 78 per cent pure lime, and one submitted by Adeline Close tested 70 per cent reports County Agent R. M. Knox. Applications of about 2,600 pounds of this material, will comply with Agricultural Conservation program requirements calling for one ton of lime, he said.

Prepare Soil Early
In gardening as in Christmas shopping an early start is important. Size up your garden plot now to determine what can be done to improve the soil.

Spade or plow early. If a handful of soil gripped firmly can be crumbled readily upon release, the soil is in condition to be plowed or spaded. If the handful of soil does not crumble readily but remains packed, put off the job until a later day.

Any soil is enriched by manure. Clay soils are improved in texture and sandy soils are improved in water holding capacity by spading under manure, rotted leaves or lawn clippings or rotted garden refuse.

Complete commercial fertilizers are everywhere available. Ask for a "4-12-6" or similar mixture. Broadcast and rake in about four pounds of this per square rod just before planting.

It is important that fertilizer be used cautiously, for an excess is often harmful, particularly when dealing with production of fruits, that is, tomato, cucumber, pepper, etc.

Garden preparation effort is wasted if you do not plant seeds from dependable sources. Select your favorite varieties at the nearby store before the supply is depleted. Make sure they are freshly packed.

To gardeners who also like to maintain an excellent lawn—carelessness of renewal again is important. Take advantage of a comparatively warm, early spring day when the surface is almost bare and the soil is calm.

Sow about a teaspoonful of seed 100 square feet of lawn. Melted snow carries the seed into the soil and subsequent light snows will be beneficial. Tender seedlings thus get a good start before the days become too warm.

Cherry Fruit Fly Controlled
SALEM—Almost complete control of the cherry fruit fly was obtained in the large Lambertia orchards 10 miles east of here by following the spray recommendations worked out by the Oregon experiment station, according to reports made by the growers to S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist at O.S.C. The Lambertia orchards have approximately 200 acres of cherries, probably the largest cherry orchard in the Willamette valley. Although three spray applications will ordinarily give control, five sprays were applied in these orchards to be on the safe side. The material used is a sweetened poison bait spray applied to the foliage to kill the adult flies just before the cherries ripen.

A new low monthly record for traffic deaths was set during February in Oregon when six fatalities were reported. Secretary of State Earl Snell announced recently. The previous low mark of 12 deaths was attained in February, 1931 and again in February, 1933. Seven teen persons were killed on Oregon highways in February of last year.

WHEATON SCOP—ANOTHER VICTORY

Wheaton College Men Debaters won their third consecutive state championship Saturday, March 25 when they copped the first place trophy in the annual Illinois Intercollegiate tournament at Bloomington, Illinois. They were undefeated in 12 debates, in the tournament.

Harold Lindsell of New York, N. Y., Kenneth Taylor of Beaverton, Oregon, Roger McShane of Davenport, Ia., and Thomas Lindsay of Detroit, Mich. veteran seniors repeated their triumph of last year by winning over Augustana College in its semi-finals and by a unanimous vote of the judges from Northern Illinois State Teachers College, DeKalb, in the finals. Twenty Illinois colleges competed in the meet.

This is the first time in tournament history that any school has gone through a final state tournament undefeated through out. It climaxes Dr. Clarence L. Nystrom's third year as coach of the Wheaton speakers.
