

Sweet Suggestions For Eastertime

Ever since eggs were accepted as the symbol of new life, they have been "eggactly" right for Easter. But the breakfast egg alone does not make our Easter-tide. There must be some of the candy kind too; there must be a festive cake, a special dessert, a gala menu! Easter ends Lent and the sweet tooth may be satisfied; the end of the Sunday parade marks the beginning of the feast.

Here then, are suggestions for Easter eating. Many of them carry out the golden colors of the springtime daffodil; all extend the spirit of the blithe season!

EGGS FOR THE HUNT

Cheery Easter Eggs
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup white corn syrup
Red fruit coloring
1 teasp. vanilla
1 pkg. cocoanut
Boil the sugar, water and corn syrup to the soft ball stage 238° F.). Remove from fire and let it stand until lukewarm (110° F.). Add fruit coloring to make delicate pink. Add vanilla and shape like Easter eggs. Roll in cocoanut. Place on waxed paper to harden. Makes 12 to 18 eggs.

Easter Confections

Put a 10-ounce package of dates or use the ready-pitted variety. Stuff each date with nutmeat, wrapping date entirely around the stuffing. Make orange fondant by creaming 2 tablespoons butter, stirring in gradually 1 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 egg yolk and the grated rind of an orange; add a little orange juice; roll stuffed dates in the fondant, and form into shape of Easter eggs. For a variety of "Easter Eggs" plain fondant may be used, and then tinted in pastel shades—pale pink, delicate green, lavender, etc.—with vegetable coloring.

Easter Party Cake

2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teasp. baking powder
1/2 teasp. soda
1/2 teasp. salt
1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
1 cup mashed banana (2 to 3 bananas)
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
1 teasp. vanilla extract
1 cup heavy cream whipped and sweetened
3 bananas, sliced
Sift together the flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add milk to mashed bananas. Rub the shortening to a creamy consistency with the back of a spoon. Stir the sugar, a few tablespoons at a time, into the shortening and continue stirring after each addition until light and fluffy.

Add eggs and beat well. Add flour mixture, alternately with combined milk and bananas, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Stir in flavoring. Pour into greased layer cake pans and bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) about 30 minutes or until cake is done. Cool. Put cool layers together with whipped cream and sliced banana. Spread whipped cream over top of cake and garnish with sliced banana. Makes two 8-inch layers.

Daffodil Bavarian Cream

1 1/2 tbsps. granulated gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 1-3 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk
2 tbsps. lemon juice
1 cup fresh orange juice
Grated rind of 1 orange
1/2 cup whipping cream
Soften gelatin in cold water; place over hot water to dissolve. Add sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice, orange juice and grated orange rind. Blend thoroughly. Place bowl in pan of ice water and stir until mixture begins to thicken. Fold in whipping cream. Turn into mold. When set, unmold on a serving and place in refrigerator to chill. Garnish with candied cherries and chopped nuts, if desired. Serves 8.

Easter Breakfast Muffins

3 tbsps. shortening
1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup all-bran
1/2 cup corn meal
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teasp. salt
1/2 tbsps. baking powder
Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly; add egg, beat until creamy. Add milk, all-bran and corn meal. Let soak until most of moisture is taken up. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together; add to first mixture, stirring only until flour disappears. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 30 minutes. Yield: 14 muffins (2 1/2 inches in diameter) or 12 muffins (3 inches in diameter).

Banana Fruit Salad Bowl

Wash and dry carefully one or more varieties of fresh crisp greens and place in salad bowl. Arrange long strips of banana attractively on the greens. Add a variety of other fruits such as orange and grapefruit sections, slices of avocado, thin slices of unpeeled apple, strips of fresh pineapple, whole berries or cherries. Serve with French dressing.

Myrtle Wood Process Developed

HOW I BECAME A RADIO STAR

I was raised in the brilliant glow of footlights. Mother was a pianist and Father a Shakespearean actor. Nevertheless, despite this auspicious start toward fame in the theatre, I had no thought of being a trouper. I wanted to be a lawyer.

Of course, before I could talk, I was unable to defend myself. As a result, I appeared on the stage as a baby, carried in my father's arms. I played several children's roles, and everyone came to expect big things of me some day in the theatrical world.

However, even as a youngster I worried under the high tension of theatre life. It was I for a quieter kind of existence. Still I wanted to be in the thick of events. The practice of law seemed the logical out for this desire.

Grammar school, strangely enough, was never irksome. Every week, I commuted to New York City to sing in the choir of St. John the Divine Cathedral. At fourteen, I was a boy soprano soloist. Singing was great sport, but at the time I couldn't see making a life's work of it.

In time I gained a scholarship at the Taft School in Connecticut, and spent four years there preparing for Yale. I was active in the Glee Club, and ran on the track team. Then Yale awarded me a scholarship. During my freshman year there I made the Glee Club as well as the track team. As an upperclassman I became a soloist and head of the choral organization. Meanwhile I was active in athletics, and managed to hang up a collegiate record in the 440-yard dash. But in 1928, upon graduation, I gave up a chance to enter the Olympics, so that I could go to Europe with the Glee Club.

In my senior year at Yale, I commuted once a week to New York to appear in a male quartet on a commercial radio program. It was my first experience at the microphone and I must say I liked it.

After leaving New Haven, I pursued my post-graduate law course at Columbia University. Three years later, I was admitted to the bar of the State of New York. About this time I realized that lawyers' fees were small, at least at first; that I still enjoyed singing, and that a career as a vocalist might be more

It was anguish, shame, remorse; it was what the lost must taste thru endless ages shut away from God by sins unrepented of; it was the pains of eternal hell that He endured to the full. Yes, in those hours that Jesus Christ hung on the cross, He knew to the uttermost by reason of His infinite power of suffering, all that the Judgement Day and beyond held for me. "All we like sheep have gone astray, we have turned every one to his own way and the Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all." And this—"Christ hath once suffered for sins, the just for the unjust, that he might bring us to God."

To as many as come broken, having no hope in themselves God listens. To all who name Christ as the lamb that was slain to clear them, God imparts the gift of eternal life. So we see Jesus—Christ—who for the joy that was set before Him, endure the cross and despise the shame. And what was that joy? That He might bring you blameless to His Father and name you as His own.

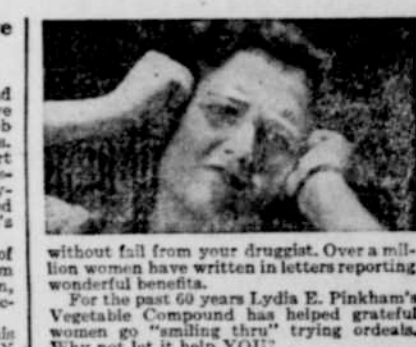

FOR THE FIRST PARTY OF SPRING



SIMPLE refreshments are appealing to the hostess — and certainly to the guests when the refreshments happen to be RHUBARB PUNCH and EASTER DAINTIES.

RHUBARB PUNCH

(Serves 6 to 8)
2 cups fresh rhubarb (cut in small pieces)
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 1/2 pints gingerale
Cook rhubarb in water until tender. Remove from flame, add sugar and beat with rotary beater until smooth. Just before serving, add lemon juice and gingerale. Pour over taste-free, crystal-clear ice cubes. These may now be obtained from the ice service man, or quickly cut with a cuber gadget, from

the cake of ice in a modern air-conditioned ice refrigerator.

EASTER DAINTIES are especially practical from the standpoint of the hostess. They may be made up the morning of the party, or even the day before if she has a modern air-conditioned ice refrigerator, and chilled until serving time.

To make them: Spread sweetened and flavored whipped cream between small vanilla wafers, using 5 for each serving. Spread the outside with whipped cream, then carefully roll in shredded cocoanut. Chill for at least 4 hours.
