Hints To Gardeners

For Early Flowers

EARLIER blooming of some of the popular garden flowers may be obtained by planting them indoors about six weeks before they are to be set out in the open. They should be placed outdoors, of course, only after the ground has warmed and all danger of frost is past.

A few of the flowers which may be planted early indoors include the delphinium, pink, gailardia, lobelia, myosotis, pansy, Iceland poppy, salvia, stock and verbenas.

The following may be planted indoors a week or two later: Ageratum, snapdragon, aster, dahlia, nicotiana, petunia, phlox drummondii, salpiglossis, scabiosa and vinca rosea.

Seed of these flowers may be obtained at your corner store at a sufficiently early date to allow you to give them an inside start.

Seed of other favorites, which may be procured at the same time but which should be saved for later outdoor planting, include the sweet alyssum, calendula, calliopsis, candy tuft, four o'clock, marigold and nasturtium. These are earlier and faster growing than the others.

For the inside planting, fill a cigar box or florist's "flat" with good, rich loam, covering the seeds with a thin sprinkling of soil. The boxes should have small holes (about quarter inch in diameter) in the bottom so they may be set in water and the soil moistened by absorption.

If the small plants are too thick, some should be picked out. The boxes should be placed in a sunny window and kept at a temperature of around 70 degrees.

If desired, the small plants may be transplanted to pots or other larger containers. Before setting outdoors they should be "hardened off," placed outdoors in the shade six or eight mild days.

This new structure housed all eight grades and high school. In 1916, Miss Merle Davies, present principal joined the faculty as fifth and sixth grade teacher. In the same year the high school was constructed. Four years later, 1920, Miss Davies became principal and still serves in that position. In 1924 five rooms and a cafeteria were added to the grade school building by A. M. (Bert) Hocken.

Beavers Capture Cup At Hill Relay Meet

Beaverton is tops again when they upset the paint bucket on many anticipators and captured the first place for metropolitan schools at the Hill Relay invitational meet, April 1. Entering three events, the Beavers showed their mettle by taking two first places and setting a new record in one.

In the afternoon, Coaca Cook took four of his best weight men and entered them in the shot-put relay. The boys averaged 156 feet, 7 inches for a first place tie with the crack shot-putters from Hill. The team was composed of Harrison, Sipe, Jones and Emmons. A new record was set by Grant in the shot with 181 foot average.

Set New Record
At night Stassen, Jones, Huserik and Karpstein set a new record of 3 minutes, 15 seconds, in the sprint medley, cutting off better than two seconds from Jefferson's record.

This meet presented many special features, having several of the world's record holders competing, including: Glen Cunningham, for the mile both indoor and outdoor; George Varoff, indoor pole vault; Carl Meadows, outdoor pole vault; Cornelius Johnston, high jump; and Leo Steers, the high school high jumper who goes 6 feet 8 inches. Grant won the first place trophy in the Portland league, Beaverton tied for first in the Metropolitan league and Chemawa won first in the intermediate league.

Coach Present's Cup
The gold cup was presented by Coach Cook, to the seven boys who took first place in their division at the meet, at a special assembly called for that purpose, April 4.

In addition to this cup, each member of the winning squads received an individual medal.

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Air Mail Service Sponsors Contest

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Hero Who Aroused Minute Men in 1775 Boasted of Skill in Dental Science



When Longfellow immortalized the historic ride of Paul Revere he failed to mention the latter's tremendous pride in his dental skill. The hero who aroused minute men on that memorable night of 1775 displayed a variety of talents—goldsmith, copper roller engraver, powder manufacturer. But he took most pride in his skill in oral hygiene. In a circular he wrote of himself: "He fixes teeth in such a manner that they are not only a real ornament but a real use in speaking and eating."

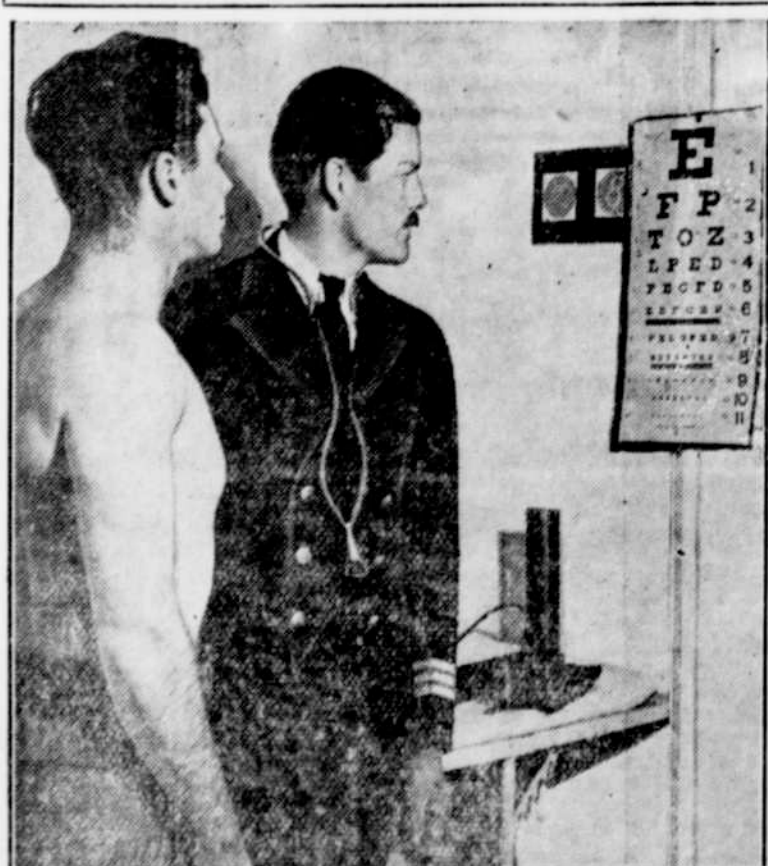
For his day, says the Dental Institute of America, Paul Revere may have rated high in the ancient profession, just as did the "dentists" of the Roman era. Bridge work and gold inlays were accomplished as early as 1000 B.C. A book published on dental science in 1530 was surprisingly complete for its time. But

even in the days of the pharaohs there were no real dentists. Many comparatively young women were toothless. The first two trained dentists arrived on these shores with Rochambeau's fleet in the Revolutionary War.

"Dental science has advanced more in the past half century than in a dozen previous centuries," said the Institute today. "The x-ray for locating centers of infection, the art of straightening teeth, the evolution of immediate dentures or plates and many other improvements have brought dental science to a high level of efficiency since the strenuous days of Paul Revere."

A society of leading practicing dentists throughout the country, the Institute has been carrying on a nation-wide survey of conditions with a view to improving the general health standard through more attention to oral hygiene.

THE "DCC" SAYS "OK"



Before he is accepted as a cadet aboard the Grace Line's "Santa Clara" James Botz, lately of the Shipburne Military Academy, is given a thorough examination by the ship's doctor, beginning with the traditional eye test. Now adopted by the Maritime Commission, the cadet system was pioneered by Grace Line's Panama Mail service, now operating the "Santa Rosa," the "Santa Elena," and the "Santa Paula," in the Caribbean service. One of the first applicants accepted by this service as a cadet was Captain Walter Prangel, in 1910, now master of Grace Line's "Santa Elena."
