Fresh Air Essential To Health

Three thousand cubic feet of air is the amount you and I must get in and out of our lungs each hour. Seven pounds of air per day go into our lungs and five go out again. Two pounds of oxygen go thru our blood to transform our food into energy and heat for the whole body. On an average, with each breath we change only one-tenth of the air in our lungs while the remaining nine-tenths lies inactive and de-oxygenated. Deep breathing, however, replaces the stagnant nine-tenths puts to work idle lung tissue, oxygenates the blood and sends it coursing to do its work. Exercise, the health essential, stimulates deep breathing and in this respect alone is of great value to our bodily well being.

We thrive on breezes, natural and artificial. Breezes blow away the warm used air and bring back fresh air. We need moving, fresh air, and without it we should promptly die. To live we must breathe, work and ventilate our lungs. Great quantities of air are necessary to flush out the carbon dioxide and impure water vapor. The air we breathe should be free from dust, dirt and germs. It is essential to health that the air be free from contamination, and in winter, especially, not too hot and dry and not motionless. We need live and not dead air.

Healthy bodies need living air not only for breathing, but for ventilating our skin. It is not just our lungs inside us that must be flushed; our whole outside skin, so to speak, breathes out vapor. Even if we don't visibly perspire, we must somehow evaporate two and a half pounds of water each day. Much of the poor work in factories, schools

and offices may be traced to the impairment of this important skin function which is itself caused by dead air. With windows closed to keep out the cold, the air stagnates, the skin acts sluggishly, and we breathe and rebreathe the same or part of the same dead air. Of course the work suffers. Among systems for providing fresh air, modern air conditioning is becoming popular for furnishing fresh air at the correct temperature.

The simplest system is the direct system which depends on the heat of the breathed air to carry it up and off. It is curious that many farms have hit on a system for their cows which is better than most of the systems in our schools. The monitor roof of the barn solves the problem. The hot breathed air rises to the sloping ceiling and escapes through the windows of the monitor top. In a school, not built for the direct system of ventilating, a good method of heating and ventilating is to thoroughly heat the room at night and open the windows using window boards so as not to cause draught. For health we need real ventilation that keeps the bad air moving out and the fresh air coming in.

ROAD BILL IS TO BE CONSIDERED

James W. Mott last Friday by Chairman O'Connor of the Rules Committee, U. S. House of Representatives, that a rule for consideration of the 1938 Road Bill will be granted within the next week, which will insure enactment of the measure before the adjournment of the Congress.

This is the bill which authorizes appropriations of Federal funds to the States in aid of road building for the next two years. Oregon's share of the money this year will be \$4,276,000 per year.

The new Road Bill was drafted and reported out several weeks ago by the House Committee on Roads, of which Congressman Mott is a member, but until last Friday there was no pos-

itive assurance that the Rules Committee would send it to the House under a rule, a procedure which is necessary before any bill can be debated and voted upon.

The delay of the Rules Committee in giving the Road Bill the right of way at this session has been the subject of much concern to the various State highway departments, all of which must plan their road building programs for the next two years in accordance with the amount of Federal money authorized under the 1938 bill.
