



Avoid Blushes Tho' A Bride

There are no blushes on the face of the bride who learns how to cook beforehand! Crying over split milk cannot be compared to the tears over sudden biscuits, pink-middled charred chops, or dilapidated pie. The bride's tears rival that Niagara Falls she and the groom viewed together!

May's the month for the June bride-to-be to take an inventory! Can she fry an egg, grill a steak, make a good cup of coffee? "Can she bake a cherry pie, Billy boy?" is an old song but as a question it is still pertinent.

Show her the bride with recipes when you shower her with linen and glass; hand her your pet recipes and invest in a couple of good standard cook books for her. Introduce her to the cookery columns (like this one—av.) and, for gentle reminder's sake, slip the following—as a starter!

Bride's "Pastry"

1 1/2 cups ground Brazil nuts
3 tbsps. granulated sugar
Mix the Brazil nuts with sugar in an eight-inch pie plate. Press this mixture with the palm of the hand against the pie plate. Fill with Butterscotch Filling made this way:

Butterscotch Filling

3 eggs, slightly beaten
1 cup sugar
1 cup dark corn syrup
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup coarsely chopped Brazil nuts

Mix the eggs, sugar, corn syrup, salt and Brazil nuts together. Pour into a pie pan which has been lined with the pastry. Bake in a hot oven (450° F.) ten minutes, then reduce heat to 325 deg. F. and bake until filling is firm, about fifty minutes.

Coffee By The Bride

The "best cup of coffee" in the world is the one that suits you best—as to flavor, color and strength. Use the same measure every time; measuring is a matter of taste; develop the proportion of water and coffee to suit your taste. Be sure the coffee is freshly ground, the water freshly boiling, and the equipment perfectly clean. Coffee should be kept in an airtight container at all times to preserve its flavor. Keep it hot during the serving period; never reheat coffee! To keep it hot during serving period, put an asbestos pad or plate over the

flame to maintain even temperature.

At-Home Salad

3 ripe bananas, sliced
1/2 cup diced pineapple (canned)
1/4 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups diced cooked or canned shrimp
1/4 cup diced celery
Mayonnaise to moisten
Crisp lettuce
Mix bananas and pineapple together. (Pineapple prevents discoloration of bananas). Add other ingredients and mix well. Serve on lettuce leaves. Garnish with chopped pimientos, green pepper or olives if desired.

Easy Shortcake

2 1/4 cups flour
4 tbsps. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
4 tbsps. sugar
1-3 cup salad oil
3/4 cup milk
Butter
Fruit or berries
Mix and sift dry ingredients and stir in salad oil quickly, with fork or knife. Stir in liquid quickly. Remove to well-floured board and knead a ball minute until dough is smooth. Divide dough in halves to fit pie pan and pat each half same shape and size to fit pan. Place one layer in pan, butter slightly, and place other layer on top of first. Bake fifteen to twenty minutes in hot oven (450 deg. F.). Split and cover with sugar crushed berries or fruit. Place other crust on top and cover with fruit or berries.

Florida Muffins

1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup canned grapefruit sections
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup milk
2 cups flour
2 tbsps. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. baking soda
Add 1/4 cup sugar to canned grapefruit segments (drained) and let stand. Cream shortening until light and fluffy; add 1/2 cup sugar, little at a time, blending after each addition. Add beaten eggs; sift flour, measure, sift again three times with baking powder and salt. Add milk and dry ingredients alternately to sugar mixture, beating well after each addition. Add baking soda to grapefruit segments; combine with muffin batter. Pour into well-greased

muffin tins and bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 30 minutes.

Hints To Gardeners

Soil Study Important

A FEW minutes consideration of the condition and make-up of the soil in your garden just before planting can make a marked difference in your success as a gardener. Clayey soils require the most careful handling but are heavily productive. Sandy soils are "early" and sandy loams are just about ideal for most home garden crops. Peas, lettuce, cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, beets, carrots, radish and onion prefer plenty of moisture and moderately cool temperatures during development. These should be planted about as early in the spring as the soil can be worked in order that they may develop before the extreme heat of summer sets in. This early planting will yield an abundance of early produce for use during Spring and Summer and for canning. Plant most of these again during the Summer, timing the planting date so that the crops will grow and mature during the cooler months of Fall.

Sweet corn, beans, tomato, pepper, egg plant, cucumber, melons, squashes and pumpkins are not so hardy as those listed above and prefer plenty of heat and sunlight for best development. They also prosper best when ample moisture is available but are able to do well during comparatively dry weather. They do best on loamy soils but carefully prepared clay soils produce splendid crops.

Herbs do well in comparatively poor soil and maintain growth under rather drouthy conditions. Under the same conditions, radish, turnip, parsnip, salsify and other root vegetables may be expected to perform fairly well.

If you must do some of your gardening in ground that is shaded, try growing beans, radishes or peas.

Hints for Homemakers

INSTEAD of discontinuing the service of winter vegetables that have made their appearance too frequently at the table, dress them up in a style that will make them seem new to the eye as well as the palate. An intriguing new sauce prepared with Brazil nuts, for example, will do a great deal in bringing cauliflower back into favor. The tested recipe is easy to follow:

Cauliflower With Brazil Nut Sauce
1 head cauliflower
4 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup chopped Brazil nuts
Remove leaves from cauliflower and soak in cold water thirty minutes. Cook in a very small amount of water with a dash of sugar and of salt in a heavy, covered utensil. When tender, drain. Melt one tablespoon of the butter, add nuts and when brown, add remaining butter. Pour this sauce over the cauliflower.

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Memorial Day — In or Out

Here are "testing tips" for Memorial Day, no matter what your plan. If you contemplate your first picnic, you will find the first recipe an ideal menu course meat and vegetable dish. Cook the stew at home, heat it in the open and you will have something hot to go with your other picnic foods. The salad (second recipe) may be made easily at the picnic ground. It's a wonderful balancer. The pie is something unusual for expected company at home, while Maple Delight is a good dessert or bedtime snack for either children or adults.

Outdoor Picnic Stew
1 cup dried lima beans
2 pounds of lamb cut into cubes
2 small potatoes, sliced
1 small onion, sliced
1 cup canned corn
1 cup canned tomatoes
Heat the meat cubes in brown fat. Put onion, onion and potatoes into a covered casserole, cover with boiling water and simmer gently for 1 1/2 hours. Add lima beans, corn and tomatoes. Bring to the boiling point, and cook 5 minutes. Cover tightly and cook slowly for about 3 hours.

Orange Date Nut Salad
(Serves 4)

Cut lettuce-covered salad plate, and 1/2 cup of 5 or more small orange slices. Within this circle, make a second circle of egg with 4 or 5 orange segments. Fill cup with orange segments, sliced 4 or 5 around with white sauce. Arrange orange slices. Top mayonnaise with a walnut half.

Strawberry Chiffon Pie

1 1/2 cups fine dry bread crumbs or crushed zwieback
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup melted butter
2 pints strawberries
1/2 cup sugar
Juice of 1 lemon
1 tablespoon gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 pint heavy cream
Mix crumbs with the 1/2 cup sugar and blend in the melted butter. Turn into a 9 or 10 inch pie tin or spring-form pan, and pat down so bottom and sides are covered with a uniform layer. Place in refrigerator.

Wash, hull and crush the strawberries, reserving 4 choice ones whole for garnish. Four sugar over crushed berries and allow to stand 10-15 minutes. Soften gelatin in cold water. Drain juice from berries, heat to boiling, remove from fire, and stir in gelatin. Cool and add berries and lemon juice. Chill in refrigerator until mixture begins to congeal. Whip cream until stiff. Reserving 1/4 cup for garnish, fold remainder into strawberry mixture. Turn into the crust and chill 2-3 hours in refrigerator. Just before serving, spread or pipe remaining cream over surface. Garnish with halved strawberries. Yield: 8 servings.

Maple Delight

1 rennet tablet
1 tablespoon cold water
1 pint milk
1/2 cup maple syrup
Make rennet-custard according to directions in package, using 3 tablespoons maple syrup in place of sugar and vanilla. Chill in refrigerator. Before serving, top each dish of ice cold rennet-custard with the rest of the maple syrup.
