BEAVERS WINNERS IN DISTRICT MEET

Beaverton walked away with high honors at the district track meet May 14, with Forest Grove trailing in second place with 32 points to the Orange's 55.

For the first time the district meet was held on the Beaverton field. In the past it has been held on the Pacific University field at Forest Grove.

Mr. L. R. Metzler, principal of Beaverton high school and vice president of the T.Y.V. arranged for the meet to be held at Beaverton under the supervision of Coach Cook. From all indications the district meet will be held here in the future.

Five counties, Yamhill, Washington, Tillamook, Columbia and Clatsop were represented, a total of 13 schools.

Of the six records broken, Forest Grove broke three, Beaverton, one, St. Helens one, and Seaside one. The new records are in the 100 yard dash, 440 yard run, high jump, low hurdles, high hurdles and relay.

Beaverton was awarded the large traveling trophy, formerly in possession of Forest Grove, last year's champs. Forest Grove won the 880 yard relay cup and the boys winning a first or record place get to attend the state meet at Corvallis to participate May 20 and 21.

The competition was better in some events than usual while a little weak in others. The schools present were: Beaverton, the victors with 55 points, Forest Grove with 32, Seaside, 29, Scappoose, 23, Amity, 21, St. Helens, 14, Astoria, 13, Hillsboro, 7, McMinnville, 5, Dayton, 4, Clatskanie, 3, Rainier, 0, and Vernonia, 0.

Red Creeping Fescue Planted

OREGON CITY—Red creeping fescue grass for seed is being planted this year by three Clackamas county farmers, reports County Agent J. J. Inskeep, who believes these are the first commercial plantings of this grass in the county. The seed came from a planting on the farm of Henry Schmidt of Garfield. Farmers planting the seed this year are V. C. Dopp, Liberal; Charles Gerber, Clarkes, and Ray Reitsma, Boring. Vernon Hepler of Canby also has a small lot of seed grown on the nursery established on his farm in 1936 from seed furnished by the experiment station. Creeping fescue seed has formerly been obtainable only in small lots from England. It is considered an excellent pasture grass, and believed to have great promise as a lawn grass.

Cover Crop Saves Orchard Soil

ALBANY—A densely seeded cover crop of vetch on his hillside orchard proved surprisingly successful in controlling erosion this past winter, D. W. Porter of Albany reported to County Agent Floyd Mullen and members of the Soil Conservation service when they visited his farm recently. Not one-twentieth of the soil washed down the hillside last winter as in previous years, he said.

Will Flood-Irrigate Berries

McMINNVILLE—With the hope of increasing vegetative growth and thus making harder bud formations for next year's crop, Ward Mendenhall of Willamina plans to flood irrigate his five-acre field of Red Heart strawberries immediately after the first picking, according to Co. Agent Rex Warren.

Deschutes Increases Irrigation

REDMOND—Irrigation systems have been surveyed with the aid of County Agent Gus Hagglund recently to handle a total of 325 acres on 13 different farms in Deschutes county. Many other requests for assistance have been received, Hagglund says, and will be cared for as soon as possible.
