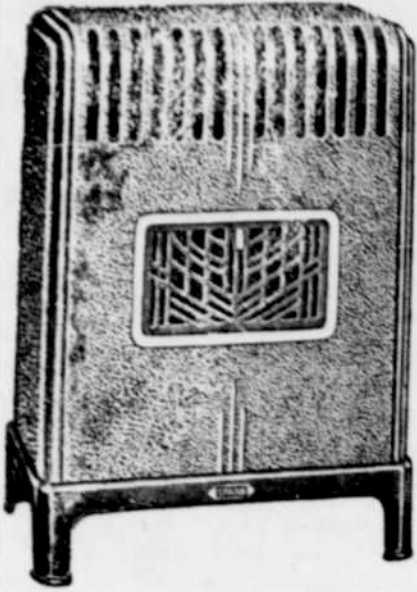

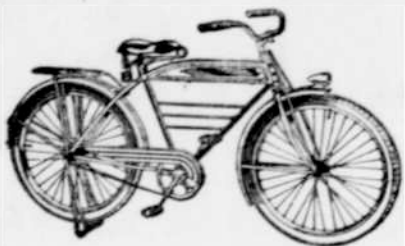

### Sprays Control Prune Thrips

McMINNVILLE—The prune thrips can be controlled by well timed and carefully applied sprays was demonstrated on the Roy Fryer farm, where County Agent Rex Warren, S. C. Jones assistant entomologist at O.S.C. and Mr. Fryer cooperated in demonstration trials on 100 acres of prunes. Two plots received no spray, two plots received application of oil-nicotine, two plots received two applications of oil-nicotine, two plots received one application of lime sulphur nicotine and two plots received two applications of lime sulphur nicotine. At blossom time it was evident that both oil nicotine and lime sulfur nicotine reduced damage by thrip, but little difference was seen between the one and two spray applications. Mr. Warren said. Yields will be checked at harvest time.

### Vetches Make Huge Cover Crop

ALBANY—Nearly 20 tons of green material per acre was produced by mixed vetch in the cover crop trial established on the F. L. Bullman farm on river bottom land in Linn county as compared to only a little more than two tons per acre of fall rye seeded in an adjoining plot, says County Agent F. C. Mullen. The trial was established cooperatively by County Agent Mullen and Mr. Bullman on October 9 to determine which of the commonly used cover crop materials produced the greatest tonnage of organic material. A harvested portion from each plot will be dried and the growth calculated on the basis of dry weights, before any recommendations are made, Mr. Mullen says.

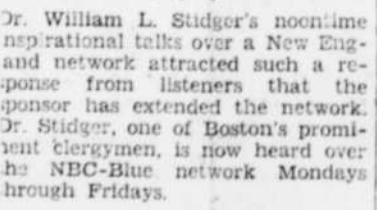

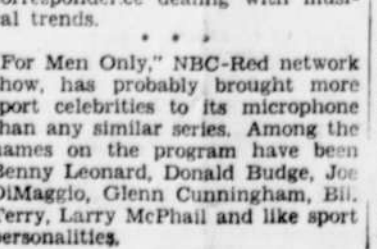
