Where Is Swimming Safe?

About this time of year the State Health Department is deluged with questions in regard to the safety of bathing places. The only safe place that the Board can recommend at the present time is a swimming pool licensed as Class A, Class B and C. Pools are reasonably safe if they are given proper daily care.

The State Board of Health has not been authorized by law to license bathing beaches. The safety of these beaches depends entirely on the amount of pollution that takes place in these streams as they drain the valleys through which they flow. In a densely populated district where the cities are using the water carriage method of sewage disposal the streams are contaminated and are apt to be unfit for bathing purposes. Every intelligent person should know by this time that the Columbia and Willamette Rivers below Portland are unfit places for swimming.

It is practically impossible to put all the unsafe and questionable bathing places in the

state of Oregon. For this reason the Board has restricted its approval to swimming pools that are properly supervised from a sanitary and safety standpoint. It is equally impossible to provide lifeguards for all of the streams in this state.

Many of the larger streams of this state are unsafe from a sanitary standpoint for swimming purposes. As long as cities are permitted to dump raw sewage into these rivers there is no possibility of rendering them safe to bathers. A remarkable improvement in sewage treatment in the state could be obtained if it were possible to secure legislation which would require all cities to render harmless all sewage before it is permitted to be dumped into the streams. The first step in this direction has been taken by the National Government by the enactment of a law whereby it is possible for states to cooperate to clean up the streams of the entire country. A law which would make it possible for the state of Oregon to cooperate in this program has been prepared and it is hoped that this movement can be voted upon at the next general election. Theoretically, the only safe place for bathing would be in water which is fit for drinking purposes. It has been found that the only way to provide water for safe drinking purposes at the present time is to use some method of purification. The smaller streams in the sparsely settled districts of this state are of course much less dangerous than those in the more populated districts. Many of our smaller streams in the mountains are safe but there is no way of absolutely safeguarding them from human contamination.

It is for this reason that cities

have provided the bathing pools in which it is possible to exercise every care towards accidents and the spreading of communicable diseases. The Oregon State Board of Health has been continually urging the cleaning up of the streams of this state. At the present time it licenses and inspects all swimming pools and the danger from accidents and contagious diseases has been reduced to a minimum.

The safety of swimming in this state can be promoted by cleaning up our streams and establishing definite places for bathing where it would be possible to provide lifeguards and other modern methods of safety—Oregon State Board of Health

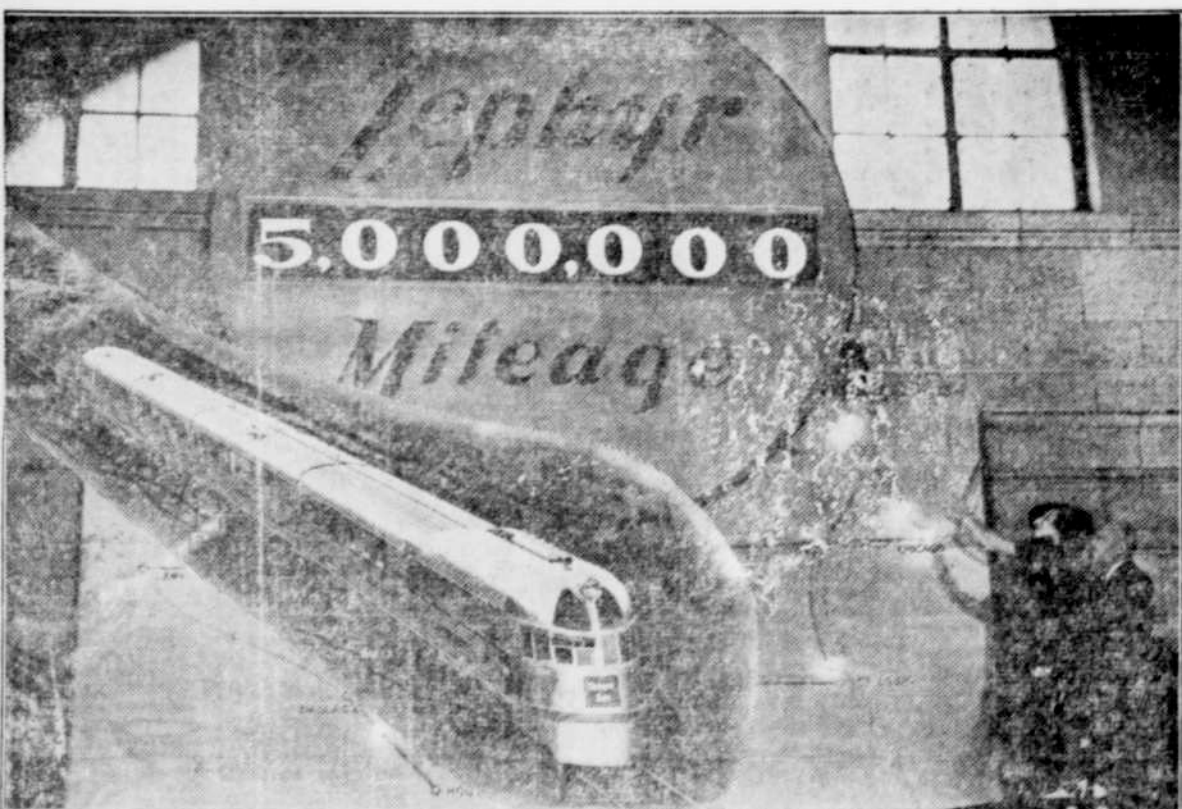

Zephyrs Pass 5 Million Mile Mark



FIVE million miles of regular passenger service was completed by the fleet of eight Zephyr trains of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad, June 21, 1938, at 6:07 P. M., Central Standard time.

near Zephyr, first of the Burlington's fleet.

Built by the Edward G. Budd Manufacturing Company of Philadelphia, builders of light-weight, stainless steel railcars, the fleet compiled the enviable record with the "availability for service" figure being approximately 95 per cent, in spite of the extremely fast schedules the trains observe.

The grand total of five million service miles is made up of the following mileage records between

Zephyr terminals: Chicago-Twin Cities, two trains, 2,007,743; Chicago-Denver, two trains, 1,512,549; Lincoln-Omaha-Kansas City, 547,701; Houston-Dallas-Fort Worth, 353,040; St. Louis-Kansas City, 308,673; St. Louis-Burlington, 270,294.

When the five million mile mark was reached the eight trains were running in six different states. Their combined current schedule calls for 5,963 miles a day—more than two million miles per year.
