Make A Guess What This Is About: Find Answer In Recipes

Marco Polo may have started it. King Solomon sometimes gets the credit. Dolly Madison introduced it into the White House. Hokey-pokey men sold it from carts with bells many years ago. It's called "our great American dessert" and expatriated citizens cry over it in foreign cafes. Children love it (especially in cones) and you can make it in a flash in your refrigerator!

Give up? The answer is—ice cream! And today's advice to the homemaker is to make some now. Summer provides the time; you provide the desire; recipes are below!

Date Ice Cream

2-3 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/2 cup dates
1/4 cup vanilla
1/2 cup fruit juice (water in which dates were cooked)
Cook dates in a little water until tender; drain and force through coarse sieve; blend together sweetened condensed milk, date pulp, date juice and vanilla. Chill. Whip cream to custard-like consistency and fold into chilled mixture. Pour mixture into freezing unit. After mixture is about half frozen remove from refrigerator, and scrape from sides and bottom of pan. Beat until smooth but not until melted. Smooth out and replace in freezing unit until frozen. Serves 6.

Macaroon Ice Cream

1 cup mashed fully ripe bananas (2 to 3)
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup salt
1-3 cup milk
2 egg whites
1 cup whipping cream
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup coarsely crumbled macaroons
Mix together bananas and lemon juice. Add the sugar, salt and milk and stir until mixed. Beat egg whites until stiff; beat cream until thickened but not stiff; beat egg yolks until thick. Combine bananas, egg whites, egg yolks and cream, then turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator. Freeze with indicator at coldest setting, stirring every 30 minutes until mixture begins to hold its shape, adding crumbled macaroons during final stirring. Then freeze until firm.

Coffee Custard Ice Cream

1 qt. milk
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup ground coffee
3 tbsps. cornstarch
1-8 teasp. salt
3 eggs
1 cup cream
1 teasp. vanilla
Add ground coffee to three cups milk. Scald and strain through double thickness of cheese-cloth. Combine 1/2 cup sugar with cornstarch and salt and stir in remaining cup milk slowly, blending carefully to make smooth paste. Stir into scalded milk and coffee mixture. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until mixture has thickened somewhat and is smooth. Cook fifteen minutes longer stirring occasionally. Beat eggs with remaining 1/2 cup sugar and add about 1 cupful of hot mixture slowly, stirring in as added. Return to double boiler when well mixed and cook two minutes longer. Remove from stove, add cream. Chill thoroughly. Stir in vanilla and freeze.

Brazil Mocha Ice Cream

1 1/2 cups milk
2 tbsps. ground coffee
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
1/4 teasp. salt
1 1/2 cups heavy cream
1 cup chopped Brazil nuts
Heat milk with coffee in the double boiler. Put half the sugar in heavy frying pan and stir until caramelized—that is, melted to a light brown syrup. Stir in remaining sugar. Strain coffee mixture through a cloth. Add the caramel and stir over hot water until dissolved. Beat egg yolks with salt and stir into the hot mixture. Cook over hot water stirring constantly until custard coats the spoon. Add the cream and Brazil nuts and pour into freezing trays and freeze 2 to 4 hours. Makes 1 quart.

Lemon Ice Cream

2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 cup corn syrup
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 teasp. grated lemon rind
1 cup cream, whipped
Beat eggs until lemon-colored. Add sugar gradually until the mixture has a thick custard-like consistency. Combine with corn syrup, milk, lemon juice and rind. Pour into freezing tray. When frozen until almost firm remove to bowl and whip with an electric or hand beater until light and creamy. Fold in

whipped cream. Return quickly to freezing tray and allow to finish freezing, stirring once after the first half hour.

"The Trail Of The Lonesome Pine"

In the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia



HE was a vaudeville performer before he wrote hit songs: pianist in a vaudeville trio that stormed the country. They played twenty weeks one record season in the Palace Theatre in New York. Born in Atlantic City, N. J., second of a family of eight children. Studied the piano at eight, professional at fourteen. He wrote musical comedies, Ziegfeld Midnight shows. Besides "The Trail Of The Lonesome Pine" he wrote "On The Mississippi," "She's The Sunshine Of Virginia," "There's A Girl In The Heart Of Maryland," "By The Beautiful Sea" and "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows." Pioneer member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, organized 1914. Now composing an operetta "without swing." His name is Harry Carroll (Music Features & Photo Syndicate)

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Our Uncle Sam Turns Housewifely; Vacuum Cleans a Harbor's Floor

Tons of silt and sand that pour down the Hudson River made trouble for great ocean liners until the U. S. A. hopper dredge Goethals was built, biggest in the world, to keep the New York harbor safe for navigation. The ship is equipped with an immense device that resembles a tremendously overgrown household vacuum cleaner, and does its work in much the same effective way. It is swept along the floor of the bay pulling up tons of sand and water by suction created by power-

ful engines placed amidships. Special bins on the dredge, corresponding to the dust bag of the average housewife's electrical vacuum cleaner, retain the sand and silt. The water drains off. The "dust" is deposited where it will do no further harm. The craft, that successfully uses a popular housekeeping principle for the safety of navigation in a busy port, was named after a famous West Pointer, the late Maj. Gen. George Washington Goethals, builder of the Panama Canal.
