Crop Insurance Plan Discussed Below

relatively small per cent of the total acreage seeded was harvested. The total number of bushels of wheat harvested in 1932 divided by the total acreage seeded in the fall of 1932 gave him an average yield on the 50 acres seeded of only 15.5 bushels. This meant that his yield per acre fell below the 19.9 bushels by an amount of 4.9 bushels per acre. Again in 1934 because of rust and Hessian fly damage his yield fell one-half bushel below the 19.9 bushels per acre. During the six year period on this farm there was a total annual loss—that is a yield below the 75 per cent of his average for the period—of 5.4 bushels per acre. Dividing this by six, which was the number of years covered in determining the average, would mean an average annual loss cost on this farm of .9 of a bushel. The Bureau of Livestock and Crops estimate has an adjusted average loss for this county of two bushels per acre. The average loss figure for the county would then be added to the loss cost for this farm which would then give a total average loss cost of 2.9 bushels per acre. The premium for the insurance on this farm would then be one-half of the total average loss cost which would in this instance be 1.45 bushels per acre.

Because the actual yield for the county is higher than the reported yield, a figure of 3.1 is added to the average yield for the base period, 1930 to 1935 inclusive, giving this particular farmer an average wheat yield of 29.7 bushels per acre. This in turn would give him an insured yield of 22.3 bushels of wheat per acre under a 75 per cent coverage policy. If the operator of this farm makes application for a policy under the federal program covering 20 acres of wheat which he intends to sow in the fall of 1938 which would cost him 1.45 bushels of wheat per acre, or a total of 29 bushels of wheat, he would pay this out of his 1938 crop and such payment would guarantee him at least 446 bushels of wheat in 1939, which he would have for sale or feed.

Anyone who will have an interest, either as owner or operator, in a wheat crop to be seeded in the fall of 1938 or the spring of 1939 may apply for a policy covering their interest in

such crop. It is not necessary that the farm on which this wheat is being grown to be listed under the 1938 Agricultural Conservation Program. However, any person desiring crop insurance for wheat in 1940 would have to have the land on which wheat is to be grown under the 1939 conservation program and would have had to comply with his wheat acreage allotment in 1939. In case of share rental agreements, both the operators and owners of such farms may apply for a policy covering their share of the crop to be seeded.

According to Clyde Kiddie, State Crop Insurance Supervisor, losses will be made good in those instances where insured wheat crops freeze out or are lost from other causes even though the acreage may be reseeded the following spring to a crop such as oats or barley. Mr. Kiddie warns that there may be a change in that section permitting payments when the above conditions occur but that at present the plan provides for such payment.

Premiums may be paid in either wheat or the cash equivalent. Small premiums should be paid in cash. Compensation for losses may be made in either wheat or cash. In order for a farmer to benefit under this program he must apply for such insurance before the wheat is seeded and before he can collect his loss he must have received his policy, paid his premium and seeded the acreage of wheat.

seeding of alfalfa which will be irrigated by the flood method. 1:30 p.m., Freudenthal farm (Fir Grove Dairy) 1 1/2 miles southeast of Hillsboro on the Hillsboro-Scholls River road. Ladino clover seeded in 1937. Ladino clover and grass seeded in 1937. canary grass pasture both irrigated and not irrigated flood system of irrigation. Saturday, July 16—10:00 a.m. Hugh Callahan farm, Patton Valley. A low pressure sprinkler irrigation system on alfalfa. This is a little different system of sprinkler irrigation than is generally being used in this county and has its place under certain conditions. 1:30 p.m., Robert Warrens farm on the Gales Creek road 3 1/2 miles west of Forest Grove. Flood irrigation on potatoes, Ladino and red clover. This is one of the larger and more diversified irrigation systems in the county. Mr. Warrens has approximately 10 years of irrigation experience on this farm.

Monday, July 18—1:30 p.m. Elmer Guerber farm, 9 miles northeast of Hillsboro near the Helvetia Church. Eleven acres of tall fescue grass just harvested for seed. Cheving's fescue, orchard grass pasture, and grass variety plots. While the grass seed here will have been harvested at the time of this field meeting you will have an opportunity to see the pasture that is available after the seed crop is taken off, the results of fertilizer treatment, and you will get the facts as to seed yield and can see some new stands.
