Cover Spray Should Be Applied Now

Spray For Codling Moth On Apples And Pears Needed

Lead Arsenate Spray Is Recommended For Use

Apple and pear growers in Washington county should apply the second cover spray for the control of codling moth if they have not applied a spray within the last week, says County Agent W. F. Cyrus. According to word received from B. G. Thompson, Assistant Entomologist of the Oregon Experiment Station, second brood moths are now present in the orchards and eggs have been deposited.

Under ordinary valley weather conditions these eggs will hatch in six or eight days. The spray should be applied before these eggs hatch.

"The recommended spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem, two pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give control.

"Calcium arsenate, used at the rate of 3 pounds powdered calcium arsenate to 10 gallons of water, has been used successfully in the Willamette Valley for codling moth control. Tests carried on by the Entomology Department of the Oregon Experiment Station over a period of seven years indicate that under Willamette Valley conditions calcium arsenate is only slightly less effective than lead arsenate in codling moth control.

"Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution if worm injury is to be prevented. Special care should be taken in spraying the upper portion of the trees, as more than half of the codling moth eggs are laid in the upper third of the tree."

New Building To Be Looked Over

Will Be Open For Inspection Until 8:00 P.M. Monday Evening

Budget Meeting To Be Held In New Auditorium

The new grade school building recently completed by School District Number 48, with the assistance of the Federal Emergency Administration will be open for public inspection on the night of the annual budget meeting, Monday, August 1, 1938.

Inspection trips will start at the hour of 7 p.m. and opportunity will be given the public to inspect the building until 8 p.m., the hour of the annual budget meeting which will be held in the new modern grade school auditorium.

The new grade school building was constructed by the contractor, George Mangus at a total cost of \$70,000; \$38,500 of which was voted at a bond election held on February 1, 1937. \$31,500 was given as an outright grant by the federal government for the construction of the project.

The new building is modern in every respect having eleven rooms, combination gymnasium and auditorium, automatic illumination, steam heat supplied by an oil burning furnace enclosed in a reinforced concrete furnace room. The building is fireproof.

4-H CATTLE TESTED FOR ABORTION

60 head of 4-H dairy cattle were tested for abortion by Doctors Almgust and Coon, for entry in the Washington County Fair, states L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. This test is a part of the abortion test requirements established by the fair board.

Washington County Fair's abortion test regulations, which require that herds be accredited and that the animals entered in the fair have individual tests within 30 days of the date of the fair, makes the county fair the strictest and cleanest fair in the state. This ruling was made at the recommendation of the 4-H dairy leaders for the express purpose of offering exhibitors of dairy cattle at the fair every protection possible from picking up infectious abortion.

This strict ruling will have little effect on the number of club members who will be eligible to exhibit, states Francis, since the majority of the herds from which club members stock comes are either accredited or have met with the requirements for accreditation.

Special Awards To Be Made At Fair

Largest Number Of Breeds Special Awards Are Offered

Awards Determined By Exhibits, Showmanship, Etc.

The largest number of breed special awards ever to be offered to 4-H Club members at the Washington County Fair are being offered by breeders and breed associations this year.

The Washington County Jersey Cattle Club is sponsoring another breed special which makes the fifth year that this association and its breeders have offered purebred Jersey heifers as inducements to the club members to do better work. In 1934 and 1937 the breed special was awarded by Mr. and Mrs. Dave Storey of Forest Grove. D. G. Lilly of Forest Grove awarded breed specials in 1935 and 1936. W. T. Putnam Junior, also awarded a breed special in 1936.

The breeder who will award the purebred calf this year has not been announced as yet. Winners of the breed special in the respective years were: 1934, Jack Peppard; 1935, Richard Hagg; 1936, Donald Hagg and Maxine Waldron; 1937, Bill Foster.

Adrian Hornecker, who in former years was an outstanding pig club member in Washington County, is awarding for the third year a purebred Chester White gilt, for outstanding club work in that breed. Merrill Mead of Banks, was the first winner of the Hornecker breed special in 1935. Jerry Schwank of Schefflin won the award in 1936 and his sister Margaret was the winner in 1937.

The Washington County Guernsey Cattle Club will award for the second time a purebred Guernsey heifer calf to the boy or girl who makes an outstanding record in club work with Guernsey cattle. This award was made last year for the first time by Rieben Brothers and was won by Wilbur Nyberg of Tualatin. The breeder who will make the award this year has not been selected.

The Duroc Jersey breed of hogs will be represented by a breed special this year for the first time. Clayton Nyberg, outstanding club member and leader of Tualatin is awarding a purebred Duroc Jersey gilt to the outstanding pig club member who has Duroc Jerseys.

All of these breed special awards are determined by the club members exhibits, showmanship, herdsman's record book and general 4-H record.

The breed specials form one of the principal incentives for club members to improve the quality of their club work and offers one of the best opportunities for the boys and girls to secure a start in high quality purebred livestock.

KIWANIS CLUB HAS INTERESTING MEET

FIFTEEN INDICTMENTS RETURNED

Fifteen indictments, all but one of which were secret, were returned Friday as the county grand jury closed its first meeting.

Dr. LeRoy E. Smith was charged with threatening the commission of a felony by the grand jurors in the only open indictment.

William A. Persinger, one of the witnesses in the first two Estabrook trials was arrested Saturday evening in Portland by State Patrolman Sheridan on a warrant charging perjury. The warrant was issued following Persinger's secret indictment by the grand jury last week.

Estabrook's third trial has been set for September 6 in Judge R. Frank Peters court. Suit for a decree annulling marriage was filed in circuit court this week by Archie L. Matton by his guardian ad litem, Lucille I. Mattoon, against Roxey I. Mattoon. Grounds for the suit, as stated in the complaint are that Mattoon was under age when "a form of marriage" took place between him and Roxey I. Shatto of Multnomah county at Vancouver, Washington. The complaint asserts that he did not have consent of his parents.

Suit of Jules M. Cooper against James H. Hanners and J. W. Hanners came to an end in circuit court last Thursday afternoon when Judge Peters allowed a defense counsel motion for involuntary nonsuit.

Sentence on Philip P. Kevligh and Lowell L. Shuck who pleaded guilty to breaking into and burglarizing a store, was postponed for some time in the future and both were allowed their liberty in the meantime.

By nightfall Monday Sheriff Connell and his deputies had rounded up eight of the nine men mentioned in the 15 indictments returned by the grand jury.

John Pape pleaded guilty to three indictments on morals charges. Dean Castorias pleaded guilty to supplying minors with alcoholic liquor and Charles Lipold entered a guilty plea to a morals charge. Sentences of all three were put off to Saturday morning.

William Heater, charged with giving alcoholic liquor to a minor was given until Saturday morning to plead.

M. O. Wilson, charged with assault was arraigned in court Monday and also given until Saturday to enter a plea.

Saturday is to be a busy day in circuit court if all the scheduled to appear are brought before Judge Peters.

Friday was the date set for entering of a plea by E. H. Campbell charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.

Forest Fire Situation Still Serious

Normally Six Or Eight Weeks Of Fire Season Remain

Total Of 10,847 Acres Have Been Burned This Year

The recent period of extremely dangerous fire weather is bad, coming so early in the summer, according to U. S. forest service statement just issued and should be followed by a false sense of security if the weather should take a temporary turn for the better.

"Normally we can expect an additional six or eight weeks of fire season," said M. L. Merritt, assistant regional forester, Portland. "We hope for a turn for the better in weather conditions, to enable fire fighters to get the best of the fires they now are fighting. However, such a favorable turn usually may be expected to be followed by additional bad fire weather in August and September. If smoldering fires are abandoned, or public vigilance relaxes as weather gets better, the chances are that we would have even worse fires later in the season than those we now are fighting. This has been the history of past serious fire seasons."

Forest service cumulative fire report for the season, just compiled shows that up to July 24 there had been 777 fires started on national forests of Oregon and Washington, as compared with 364 last year. Of these 529 were caused by lightning and 248 were man-caused. Principal man causes were smokers, 104; campers 8; debris burners, 20; and incendiary 15.

Of the total of 777 started, 594 were put out under one quarter of an acre each; 152 were held under 10 acres each; and only 31 exceeded 10 acres each. According to Merritt, this shows an excellent record for the protection forces. A few of the 31 "class C" fires reached large size because of such factors as weather, humidity, difficult terrain and inaccessibility. A total of 10,847 acres have been burned, most of this acreage being accounted for by the three large fires in the Siskiyou national forest in extremely difficult, inaccessible country.

POSITIONS VACANT AT ACADEMIES

Congressman James W. Mott has announced that the First Congressional District of Oregon will have a vacancy in 1939 at both the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. To determine the eligible candidates residing in his District, Congressman Mott has requested the Civil Service Commission to hold a preliminary qualifying examination on Saturday, October 8, 1938.

Any young unmarried man, not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1, 1939 may take the qualifying examination for the Annapolis appointment.

Candidates for the West Point appointment must be not under 17 nor over 22 years of age on July 1, 1939, and not less than 5 feet, 4 inches in height.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that the applicant notify Congressman James W. Mott, 329 Oregon Building, Salem, Oregon, not later than September 1, 1938 of his desire to participate in the examination.
