DUST BOWL MIGRATION SLACKENING

Heavy rains and good crop conditions throughout the dust bowl area of the middle west appear to have resulted in a marked slackening of the migration from that region to the Pacific northwest, Secretary of State Earl Snell indicated this week.

Non-resident permits issued to motorists from the six states of Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota and Oklahoma declined more than 10 per cent during the first five months of this year, as compared with a similar period in 1937, Snell declared, while the number of non-resident motorists generally was on the increase.

"Unquestionably, the prospect of good crops in the midwest has kept at home many farmers who otherwise would have visited the northwest seeking new locations," Snell commented.

He said that tourist travel from the region east of the Mississippi, and from the neighboring states of California, Washington and Idaho, has registered a small but definite increase since last year, when all tourist records were broken.

ALBANY—More English ryegrass is grown in Linn county than in all other counties in the United States combined, according to County Agent F. C. Mullen, who reports field inspection for certification of 2,680 acres during June for 74 farmers. This is 1082 acres more than was grown in 1937. This crop is of value not only for its seed but for the early spring and early fall pasture it provides for sheep and cattle, he says. The largest acreage this year is that of Snucker Brothers of Harrisburg, with 700 acres in one field.

PLEA TO REDUCE FATALITIES GIVEN

A strong plea for united effort to reduce Oregon's pedestrian fatalities is contained in a leaflet published this week by Secretary of State Earl Snell who announced it will be widely distributed throughout the state. Stating that more than 1500 pedestrians were killed or injured on Oregon streets and highways last year, the leaflet goes on to describe the chief pedestrian hazards and to explain how to avoid them.

"We want to encourage pedestrians as well as motorists not only to obey the strict letter of the law, but also to follow the rules of courtesy and common sense on the highway," Snell said. "This leaflet shows graphically how violation of those rules frequently leads to death or agonizing injury and asks for cooperation in spreading information about safe walking habits."

Community safety councils and several other organizations will assist in distribution of the leaflet, Snell said. Copies may be obtained by writing to his office in Salem.

Judge Donald T. Templeton

(Continued from First Page) taken to Tillamook where an emergency appendectomy was performed. He took a turn for the worse Monday, after apparently recovering from the first effects of the emergency appendectomy Friday afternoon.

News of his sudden death had a shocking effect on his numerous friends when received a mid-afternoon Tuesday. Known as a quiet but brilliant and highly efficient executive, Templeton had a host of friends throughout the county and state.

Judge Templeton was a native of Washington county, born in Forest Grove November 17, 1904, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Templeton. He attended Forest Grove schools and following his graduation from Forest Grove high school went to the University of Oregon, gaining his degree there in 1927. He continued on in the University law school, completing his course there in 1929 as one of the top four students of a large class.

Miss Elizabeth Potter Shipley and Judge Templeton were married at Salem, June 9, 1932.

Judge Templeton was a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity at the university. For several years he was active in the Isaac Walton League and was head of the local chapter.

He was named Washington county judge May 13, 1931, by the late Governor Julius L. Meier, as successor to the late Frank W. Livmore who died on May 9 of that year. At the time Livmore had served only four months of a six-year term.

Templeton filled out a two-year portion of the term and was nominated by a 2 to 1 vote in May, 1932, for the same office. In the November general elections of 1932 he was swept into office on another 2 to 1 tide of votes from all over the county.

His term as judge would have expired January 1, 1935. Last March he issued a statement announcing he would not be a candidate to succeed himself.

When Judge Templeton took the oath of office for the post of county judge from Edward C. Luce, then county clerk, he was the youngest county judge in the history of Oregon being only 26 years and six months old.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Templeton; a son, John; a daughter, Judith, less than three months old; his mother, Mrs. John Templeton of Forest Grove; a brother, Hill Templeton of Portland; and five sisters: Mrs. Maveine Abraham of Long Beach, Cal.; Mrs. C. Morrill of Oakland; Mrs. Bea Oaken of San Francisco; Mrs. Florence Ethington of Seattle, and Mrs. Louis Schultz of Forest Grove.

MRS. EMMA E. NAGEL

Mrs. Emma E. Nagel, former resident on Division St. which parallels the Farmington road, died at Gladstone Tuesday. She was attending Seventh Day Adventist camp meeting when suddenly stricken. She formerly conducted Bible school at Huber.

Mrs. Nagel was 73 years of age at the time of her death. Some few months ago she fell and broke her hip. Since that time she has been living in Portland.

Three sons, S. A. Lee and Charles L. and one daughter, Mrs. Iva Hanson and two brothers, Wesley and James Covey survive.

Funeral services are being held this morning (Friday) at ten, at the Pearson Funeral parlors at Knot St. at Union Ave., in Portland. Interment will be in Rose City cemetery.

MOST composers can trace their musical heritage directly from a parent. This young fellow's mother played a rag-time piano but wanted her boy to study the classics. He went from Bloomington, Indiana, where he was born, to Indiana University to study law.

But music had him and he began to write. Paul Whiteman liked his "Washboard Blues" and New York publishers called him. He saw no future in that and went to banking, then to Florida to practice law—but he still had swing in his heart. Back he went to Indianapolis for a last stand with his profession—and the law saw the last of his efforts. "Star Dust" had created no furor for two years—then suddenly, after the young composer had been rejected by Hollywood—the song "broke" and hit the high heavens of success. Now the movies demanded him.

But he cast his lot with music and joined the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers, where his royalty classification has increased with the production of such other songs as "Lazy Bones," "Lazy River," and "Little Old Lady." His name is
