Sunburned Or Suntanned

Enthusiasm is perhaps the outstanding American characteristic. A misguided enthusiasm for the summer sun may result in uncomfortable burns as well as serious constitutional disturbances.

From a strictly scientific standpoint there can be no question that the direct rays of the sun upon large exposed surfaces of the body are of real benefit. This fact has been known for a long time and has established a recognized therapeutic means for the treatment of certain diseases. Unfortunately however, the average person apparently is unable to understand that the application of the sun's rays to be of real benefit, must be controlled or graduated.

Starting with the entirely logical premise that exposure to the sun is a good one, too many persons whose skin has been coddled and protected most of the year, will suddenly develop an over-enthusiastic affection for sunshine. This regard will be displayed by spending the first days at the seashore, mountain or camp in getting painfully burned.

The sensible application of the sun's rays is one thing, and unregulated burning quite another one. Begin with not more than twenty minutes exposure the first day and if the skin has not been burned by this exposure, increase the periods on the following days.

There is the greatest danger of excessive sunburn when abbreviated clothes, such as swim suits and shorts are adopted. Sunburn suits for children often lead to trouble. Mothers should be very careful to expose the delicate skins of their children slowly at first so there will be no danger of sunburn. It is well to avoid the midday sun when it has its greatest intensity. It is folly to lie in the summer sun for any prolonged time between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. A very slight reddening of the skin increasing day by day is all that is necessary for a healthful tanning of the skin.

CARELESSNESS IS CAUSE OF DEATHS

In spite of the fact that notable decreases in highway fatalities have been recorded in Oregon this year, the summer months have brought added evidence that carelessness at the wheel of an automobile may result in death, Secretary of State

Earl Snell reports.

Four persons were killed on the Columbia River highway east of The Dalles because one driver, traveling at an extremely high rate of speed, couldn't wait before passing another car as a third vehicle approached, and as a result his vehicle was sandwiched between the other car and the oncoming truck.

In Union county a car sped down a steep, winding hill, crashed through a guard rail and tumbled several hundred feet to the bottom of a canyon, apparently because the driver dozed at the wheel. This mishap occurred in broad daylight under good driving conditions.

The driver of a truck operating out of Salem was killed one evening when he failed to note a string of flat cars standing on a railroad track at a grade crossing. His hurtling machine knocked one of the flat cars entirely off the track and moved several others.

"In many cases just like these, the driver might be guilty of slight carelessness and escape without injury," Snell commented. "Yet these practices, if indulged in regularly, are bound to result in accidents sooner or later. Particularly at this time of year, when good conditions tempt drivers to travel fast, motorists should be careful at passing other cars, crossing railroad tracks and rounding curves on unfamiliar road."
