Isaac Walton's Shad Biscuits
Suggests Fish Stories For Table
This is the month of fishermen, when scandalous yarns are spun and tall tales told. Not only is it vacation time when "grouper fishing" becomes an occupation, disease along every stream from "crick" to ocean, but this month sees the 345th birthday of Isaac Walton, "compleat angler."

Disciples of the English Isaac include not only those who reel through life, but also who whose pretty lot is to cook the catch. Even if the net must be cast at the market, for lack of luck, don't let that stop you getting your share of fresh and fine and favorite fish!

FOR THE FISH DINNER

What goes with fish? What you want! Boiled potatoes adrip with butter are believed "musts" by some, tartar sauce by others. Cole slaw lends the crunching note you need, and certainly any fish dinner should wind up with a big, hearty cup of good coffee—the perfect ending to any meal. New but instantly deemed perfect as the accompaniment to fish are bananas; baked, broil or fry them, whichever method you are using for the fish. They serve as garnish and vegetable (even instead of potatoes) all at once!

Special Cabbage Slaw

3 cups finely shredded cabbage
1/2 cup canned grapefruit segments
1/2 cup minced green pepper
1/2 cup Celery Seed Dressing
Combine cabbage, green pepper and grapefruit, drained of juice. Mix with dressing, toss and serve.

Celery Seed Dressing

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard and 1 teaspoon paprika; bring to boiling point; cool. Add 1 cup salad oil slowly, beating constantly. Add 1 teaspoon celery seeds (or celery salt), blend well.

Brazilian Fish

4 tbsps. butter
4 tbsps. flour
1/2 teas. salt
Pepper
1/2 teas. Worcestershire sauce
2 cups milk
1 cup ground Brazil nuts
2 pimientos
1-13 oz. can tuna fish
6 whole Brazil nuts
Melt butter, stir in flour and seasonings and when well blended, stir in milk gradually. Add ground Brazil nuts. Cut six strips of pimiento for garnishing and cut remaining pimiento into small pieces; add to white sauce. Add flaked tuna fish; pour mixture into baking dish, arrange strips of pimiento and whole Brazil nuts on top and bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 15 minutes.

Serve Chef's Salad At Home

One of my best recent "finds" in easily prepared but delicious dishes, a Chicken Mousse is a salad that is also a favorite of one of the most famous chefs in the world. He is Gaston Magnin, premier chef of the world's largest ocean liner, the S.S. Normandie. His recipes produce food that world travelers look forward to enjoying when anticipating a trip, and always remember afterward.

His salads would delight the eye and palate of any housewife in any land, I am sure. This photograph he gave me, with the recipe I wanted, shows him surrounded by spectacular salads and appetizers, ready for the inroads of hungry passengers during a party on the Normandie.

The recipe I chose, and which he permitted me to pass on to my readers, is made with a prepared salad gelatin found on the Ameri-

Fish and Fruit Platter

4 small pan fish
2 tomatoes, cut crosswise, into halves
Melted butter
Salt
4 peeled bananas
Arrange fish and tomatoes on rack of broiler. Brush tomatoes with melted butter and sprinkle with salt. Place rack about 5 inches below broiler and broil in very hot oven (550 deg. F.), 6 to 8 minutes or until it is brown. Turn fish and place bananas (brushed with melted butter and sprinkled with salt) on rack of broiler. Continue broiling about 8 minutes longer, or until bananas are tender and brown. 4 servings.

Cornmeal Bran Muffins

3 tbsps. shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 1/2 cups milk
1 cup all-bran
3/4 cup cornmeal
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teas. salt
4 1/2 tbsps. baking powder
Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly, add egg, beat until creamy. Add milk, all-bran and corn meal. Let soak until most of moisture is taken up. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together; add to first mixture, stirring only until flour disappears. Fill greased muffin pans (two-thirds full and bake in moderate hot oven (400 deg. F.) about 30 minutes. Yield 14 muffins (2 1/2 inches in diameter) or 12 large muffins.

Yes—He had walked all the way from Portland—"I never ask for a ride," he explained. A gentle, reserved old man and coming from down in Georgia where fine manners abound, he would not be likely to thumb.
