NEW COUNTY JUDGE IS APPOINTED

Mrs. Templeton will serve as

Mrs. Templeton took the oath of office as Washington county judge at 10:15 Tuesday morning from County Clerk W. T. Tupper.

The new county judge was born in Eugene. While she was still in school her family moved to Forest Grove, where she received a part of her education, finishing the first two years of high school. She finished high school in Salem and then went to the University of Oregon, from where she was graduated in 1931. While in college she was affiliated with the Gamma Phi Beta sorority.

She married Donald T. Templeton on June 9, 1932, in Salem, and since that time has lived in Hillsboro.
