

MRS. FERN MCCOLLISTER

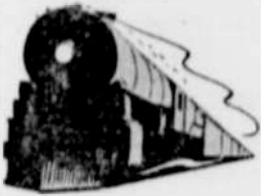
Mrs. Fern McCollister, well-known Beaverton resident passed away, August 23 after a short illness.

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AGRICULTURAL NOTES

"The production of High Quality Milk and Cream," is the subject around which the 4-H dairy demonstrations at the county fair will be based this year, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. These dairy demonstrations will be one of the outstanding features of the 4-H Club activities at the fair.

Joe Berger and Ed Setniker, of the Hazeldale Club, both former state champion demonstration team members, will be participating in the national 4-H dairy demonstration contest. Clayton and Wilber Nyberg of Tualatin will also be competing in the national contest. Both teams are demonstrating the entire procedure for handling milk from the time the cow is milked until the milk and cream is ready for shipment.

Three teams from the Rock Creek and Reedville Dairy Club will be participating in the state livestock demonstration contest and will demonstrate "Preparing the Cow for Milking," "Cooling and Storing Milk," and "Using the Milking Machine."

Through the cooperation of Monroe and Crisell of Portland and the Portland General Electric Company it is going to be possible to have a complete set of equipment for putting on the demonstration. This equipment will include a stanchion, milking machine, cooler, refrigerator, separator, wash rack and steamer, an electric dairy hot water heater. All of the equipment will be installed and operating. The milk and utensils will be handled exactly as they are on an up-to-date dairy farm.

This is the first time that this type of demonstration has been put on in such a complete form. The various teams are taking a great deal of interest and working hard and should produce some demonstrations which will be of considerable interest to the farmers and a credit to the 4-H club work in the county.

The demonstrations will take place Saturday afternoon, Sept. 3, at three o'clock.

"Culling the Laying Flock" will be the subject of the demonstration to be given by N. L. Benning Extension Poultryman, Monday August 29 at 9:30 a.m. The meeting will be held at the farm of R. E. Hermens, Route 1 Cornelia which is two miles north of Cornelius on the Cornelius-Verboort Road.

The meeting is being scheduled for the western part of the county, states Francis, in order that poultrymen who have not been able to attend the demonstrations held in the eastern part of the county in past years will be able to obtain this instruction.

Anyone interested in the problem of culling the laying flock is welcome to attend the demonstration.

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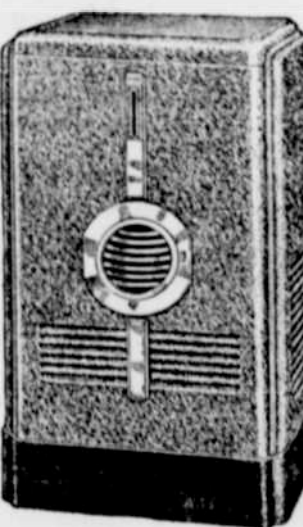
