SECOND WORLD WAR

We believe he will go on and on and on, aided by Britain's tory government as long as that government remains in office, until what's left of democracy is absolutely forced to fight for its life.....

Most of the trouble in Czechoslovakia was stirred up by Nazi agents who had been sent there for that purpose. The methods were the same as those used in Austria. The sections ceded to Germany have never belonged to Germany, though there have been times when they were forcibly annexed by Austria. Hitler rattled the saber, and French and British governments backed down. They didn't give him all of Czechoslovakia's defenses, both natural and artificial. In so doing they discarded a very good ally in the coming war. Not a big ally but a good one.

Up to now Germany has been only an empty shell in comparison with what it was in 1914. But now Germany is really beginning to acquire the sinews of war. If you think that is going to make Hitler act reasonable, then you agree with Prime Minister Chamberlain, but you don't agree with us.
