possible to tell you about all, but I feel that I must share Oregon's marble palaces with you.

Many interesting and amazing formations are found in these marble halls, largely due to water decomposing the marble, collecting the calcium carbonate, and depositing it on the stalagmites and stalactites.

These huge "icicles" grow very slowly, approximately one one-hundredth inch in 50 years, but this varies. Some of the stalagmites and stalactites have joined but others have not, such as the Wishing Post, where we were told to make a wish and rub our hand over the top.

A gorgeous butterfly, hanging on the ceiling and the graceful bird of Paradise, sitting demurely on the post, grace the scene, with musical stalagmites which when correctly touched, make a bell like sound.

The room, which I chose as most beautiful, was discovered by Dick Rawleigh, now an old man who is still living in the caves. While exploring the already known part of the cave, he glanced upward and noticed a peculiar space of weird darkness. With a crude ladder and necessary light, he climbed up and found a magnificent fairyland, or as it is called, "Paradise Lost." It is cone shaped, growing smaller at the top which is 43 feet above and has the most beautiful formations all about, making it seem like paradise.

When illuminated with different colored lights, the effect is breathtaking.

We were introduced into Hades in the Ghost Chamber, the largest room in the Caves. The deep ravine where we saw Hell Fire, the rough thicket formation, and the smoke of extinguished matches representing spirits made a very mysterious surrounding. In this room where no rays of light are possible, we experienced total darkness and an uncanny silence—broken only by the water trickling through the Caves.

These are only a few of the magnificent sights in store for you in the Caves and I wish all the Juniors and Seniors have been with me. After two hours in the marble fairyland, we found ourselves physically in Oregon's scenic and beautiful outdoors, but mentally back in Paradise. Alma Zahler, Hillsboro, Oregon.
