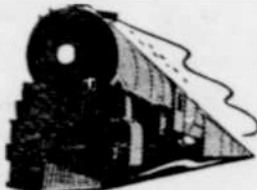

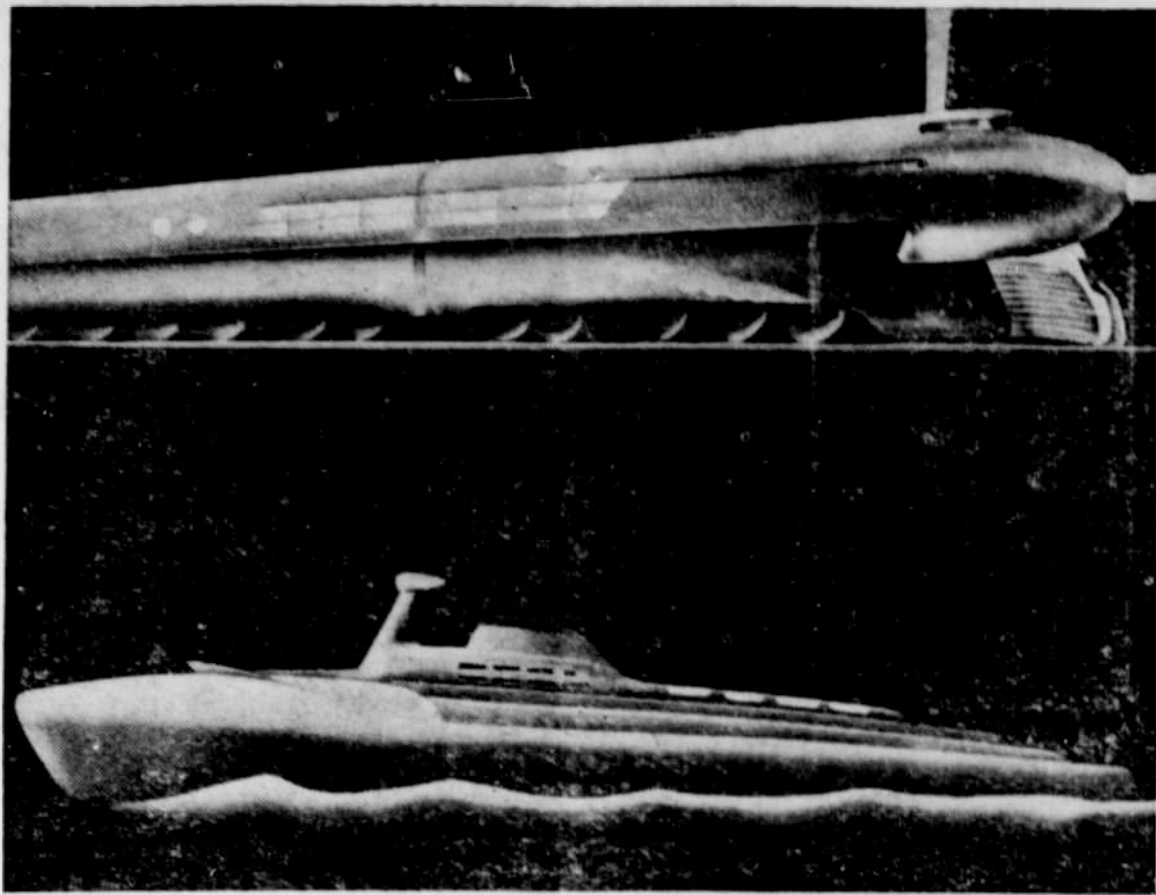

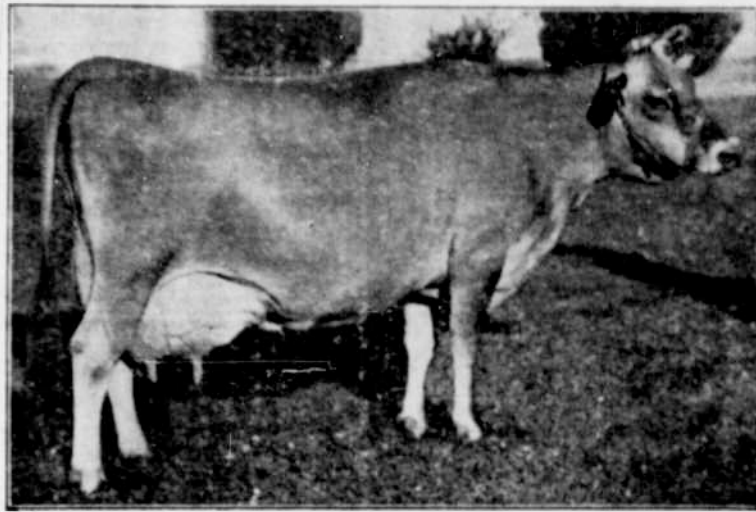

**305 Days to Equal Her Weight in Butterfat**



Producing more than her own weight in butterfat in 10 months an Oregon purebred Jersey cow, Sybil Tessie Lorna 996685, has established a new world's record for dairy cattle under 305-day test rules. Under official test supervised by The American Jersey Cattle Club, from December 1, 1937, to October 1, 1938, she produced 1020.52 pounds of butterfat. Her 305 day yield of 17,121 pounds of milk tested 5.96 per cent fat. Still milking at the rate of 48 pounds a day, the 6-year-old Jersey, bred and owned by L. A. Hulbert, Independence Oregon, is traveling across the continent to Columbus, Ohio, where she will be displayed at the National Dairy Show as "The Cow that jumped Over the Moon"
