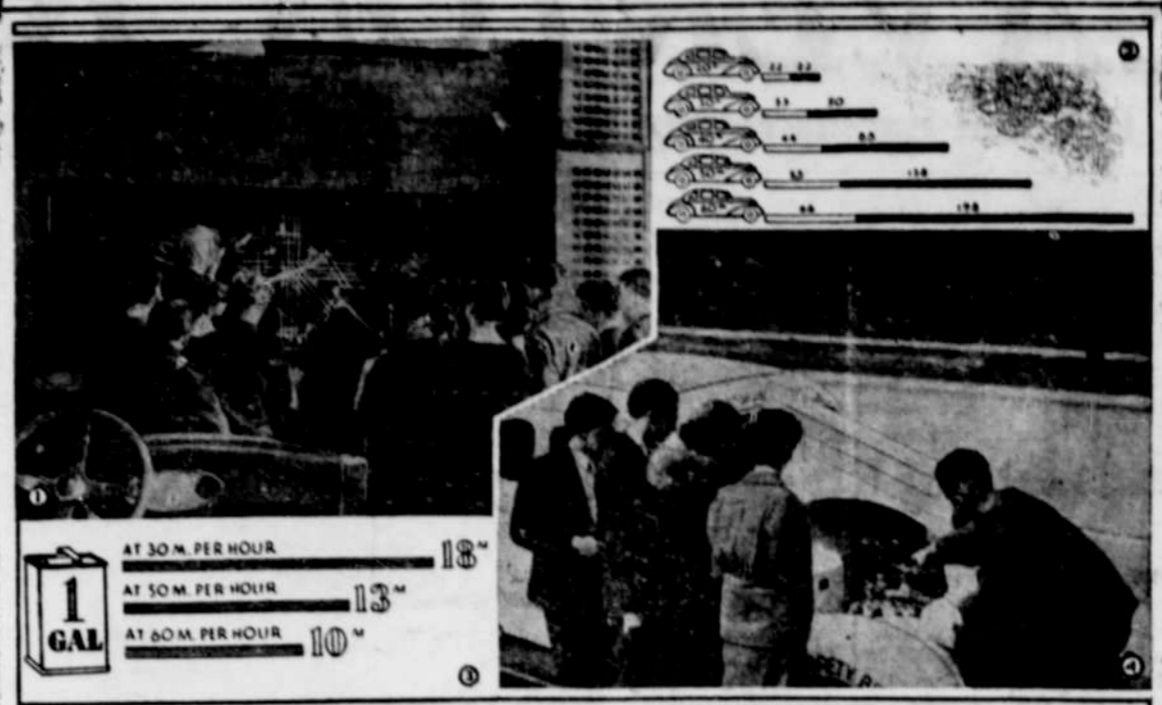

Notice just how much work he does for the income he gets. Try to figure out how he would get along if he didn't have a business or a job or some source of revenue. Perhaps he may not realize that he is just fortunate by matters of circumstances, that he enjoys the comforts he goes. There are probably just as many sincere, willing, honest and able men (although ability should have nothing to do with it) depending on WPA jobs as any number of those who are able to shift for themselves. There may be some undeserving people on relief but no greater proportion than there are outside of public assistance who make their living by their wits, performing no useful service in our social systems.
