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1939 AGRICULTURE SET UP ORGANIZED

At a meeting held in the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce on Friday, December 23, at 1:30 p. m., the county committee to hold office and to administer the 1939 Agricultural Conservation Program was elected.

Those who were elected include John W. Kaman, Route 5, Hillsboro, chairman; A. E. Krammer, Route 2, Cornelius, vice-chairman; R. Glenn Ritchey, Route 1, Forest Grove, regular member; Joseph Werre, Jr., Cornelius, 1st alternate member; and Fred H. Josey, Route 5, Portland, 2nd alternate member. Kaman, Krammer and Ritchey were re-elected to their respective offices, having served in the same capacity under the 1938 program.

Representatives of the 11 communities who elected the new officers of the Washington County Agricultural Conservation Association included Fred Langer of the Sherwood community, C. H. Thompson of Kinton, Michael E. O'Meara of Beaverton, Elmer Guerber of West Union, Joseph Werre, Jr., of Hillsboro, J. M. Vanderzanden of Roy, J. M. Brown of Manning, Milton N. Simon of Forest Grove, Joe E. McBurney of Gaston, Joseph Dober of Blooming, and James H. Moore of Laurel.

The first meeting of the newly elected county committee was held on January 3rd at which time plans for the administration of the 1939 Agricultural Conservation Program were drawn up.

MUST SIGN BY JAN. 15

January 15 is the final date for farm operators who have never signed their farms under the Agricultural Conservation Program to do if they are interested in earning grants under the 1939 program. This information was recently received in the Washington county office, reports Stan McClurg, Secretary of the Washington County Agricultural Conservation Ass'n.

Farmers taking advantage of the features of this program are under no obligation as has been the situation in past years. Requirements which must be met in order to earn payment for carrying out soil building practices include keeping seeded wheat acreage within the respective 1939 wheat allotment; there is one for the farm; total soil depleting crop acreage must be kept within the total soil depleting acreage allotment for individual farm in 1939; if the farm has a potato allotment for 1939, the farmer should keep his 1939 potato acreage within his 1939 allotment, if he intends to earn total possible payment.

Individuals who have listed their farms under Agricultural Conservation Program in past years are not required to re-list them for 1939. Any change such as increase or decrease of farm land and change of address should be reported as soon as the individual knows of any such change.

Every farm, regardless of size, is capable of earning a payment under the 1939 program providing the requirements mentioned are carried out.

"Anyone who desires information or wishes to list his farm under the 1939 Agricultural Conservation Program should either write or call at the county agent's office in Hillsboro," says McClurg.

MAKING HIGHWAYS SAFE

Portland Coos county and Deschutes county led their three divisions at the eleventh month mark in the 1938 traffic safety race, Secretary of State Earl Snull announced this week.

November saw the second biggest monthly reduction in reported accidents for the year, and a sizeable reduction in resulting injuries as compared with last year.

Washington county took 9th place among the state's ten Group 1 counties on the basis of improvement over last year in traffic accidents, injuries and fatalities. Last month this county ranked 16th in its group.

Counties in this group ranked in the following order: Portland Multnomah (outside Portland), Yamhill, Polk, Columbia, Marion, Clatsop, Benton, Washington and Clackamas.

Deschutes county has the honor of having led Group 11 during every month of the year to date, while Portland came to the top in Group 1 for the first time Coos county has topped Group 11 since midyear.
