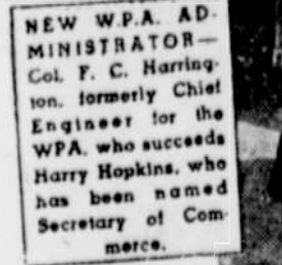

### UP FROM SLAVERY

Take these facts as a parable, if you will, for a parable is an earthly story with a heavenly meaning. A Southerner who saw it all passed the account on for us this later day.

Back before the Civil War, an Ohio man sold a piece of land and made his way into Tennessee where he would buy out of slavery an old colored Uncle, for some reason dear to the family. The owner asked a thousand dollars for this slave; the price was paid and the African set free. The Ohio man then made ready to carry his purchase back North and away from the scene of bondage. But will Uncle agree to the deal and accept his liberty? Will he leave the land of slavery to live on free soil? That he agreed to and the white man settled him in a cottage on his own land with his needs well supplied. No wonder Uncle tended the garden and kept the wood-box filled for the fires. By that he said his heart's thanks.

Take that as a parable, if you will and remember that a parable always puts us into the picture, ourselves. Here it is then. For love to you, God bought you. Not with gold or silver, but with the blood of his Son. Purchased with the precious blood of Christ, as of a Lamb Without Blemish And Without Spot. "I am redeemed but not with silver; I am bought but not with gold; Bought with a price, the blood of Jesus; Precious price of love unfold." Now a question. Will a man consent to leave the land of

slavery to get over onto free soil? You are no slave, did you say?—Live for one day with every thought, word and deed as God would have it and prove you are not in shackles to sin. Jesus Christ alone lived here well-pleasing to God. He alone overcame. He alone can break the bond of cancelled sin and set you free. And if He shall make you free, you shall be free indeed.

He that defied the law of Moses was put to death without mercy on the word of two or three witnesses. What of the man of today who tramples under foot the Son of God and regards not as holy the blood of the Covenant with which he was set free from sin and insults the Holy Spirit from which comes grace? It is an awful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.
