Driving while intoxicated is the cause of more revocations of operators' licenses in Oregon than all other offenses combined.

Reports Secretary of State Earl Snell.

During 1938, for instance, 93 per cent of a total of 848 Oregon license revocations were for driving while intoxicated. And nearly 60 per cent of these cases were "operators' cases," in which convicted persons were driving cars not registered in their own names.

"The arguments against drunken driving are well known to everyone," Snell said. "I merely wish to point out to car owners the danger of lending their automobiles when they do not know exactly how their automobiles are to be used."

The magnitude of the danger is attested by the figures I have just quoted, indicating that drinking drivers are far more willing to risk an accident with the property of someone else than with their own property."
