BURNS HIS HOME— LANGUISHES IN JAIL

V. E. Kari, 40, Beaverton Rte. 1, was arrested Sunday charged with arson.

Three attempts were made by Kari to burn his home, 1 1/2 miles east of Beaverton, it is charged. Following the second attempt his wife locked him out of the house but Kari gained entrance with an ax, and chased a wife, clad in her night clothes, from the house where she escaped to a neighbor's officers said.

With the exceptions of a dav-cup, rug and washing machine rescued from the flames by the night patrol, the house and contents valued at \$1500 was a complete loss.

Kari gave his occupation as a carpenter.

DOG LICENSE NOTICE
Dog licenses for dogs owned and kept inside of the City limits of Beaverton should now be purchased from the City Recorder at the City Hall.

The license fees for dogs over 8 months old, or for dogs kept over 30 days for the year 1939 are: male dog \$1.00; female dog \$1.50; spayed female dog \$1.00.

After March 1st, the penalty is \$1.00 for failure to procure license for the dogs above stated.
