ECONOMY MAY LEAD TO DISASTROUS END

Failure to replace a defective bulb in a headlight is not a step toward economy, but is more apt to be a costly measure of neglect, according to Secretary of State Earl Snell.

Nearly 400 accidents causing four fatalities in Oregon last year involved automobiles driven after dark with one or both headlights out. It is reasonable to assume that many of these accidents would not have occurred if the headlights had been up to standard.

Not only does the "one-eyed" driver expose himself to accident, but he greatly increases the risk to pedestrians who happen to be walking along or crossing the road he is traveling. Pedestrian safety at night requires that headlights be kept up to maximum efficiency, since it is difficult enough for a driver to see pedestrians in the road ahead of him under the best conditions.

Nearly all trucking companies have made spare headlight bulbs a standard item of equipment, and one concern in the east has gone so far as to equip every truck with a complete auxiliary lighting system operated off a separate battery.

so that in case of a failure in any part of the regular system, there will be no decrease in the truck's lighting efficiency. This step was taken in recognition of the great importance played by proper lighting in safe night driving.
