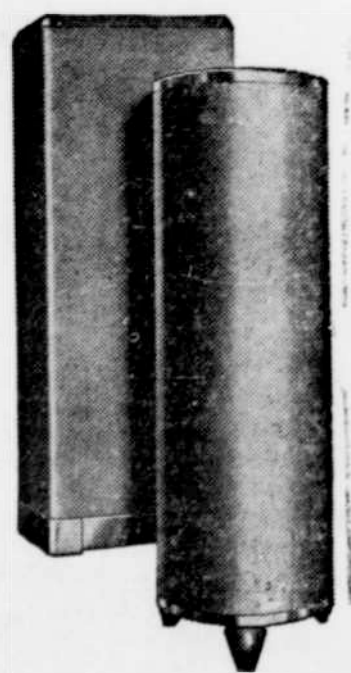

ANN REBECCA ROWELL

Ann Rebecca Rowell was born Feb. 5, 1882, in Highland county, Virginia. In 1886 she moved to Iowa with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John Jack moving to Nebraska in 1890, and crossed the plains to Oregon, by ox-team, in 1893. They settled near Farmington, now known as Jacktown, where she spent her girl-hood days and became a member of the Christian Church at that place. She had seven brothers and two sisters, the only surviving one being a sister, Mrs. Eunice Harris, of Spokane, Wash. She was married to John Daniel Rowell Nov. 15, 1874, and moved to Scholls, Oregon, where she had resided ever since.

She was the mother of five children: Francis, Elmer and James Albert Rowell and Mrs. Ina Sutherland of Scholls, and Mrs. Cassie Ratcliffe, of Portland, who passed away Nov. 30, 1925, and Carrie May, who died in infancy. Her husband died August 7, 1896, leaving the widow with four children ranging in ages from seven to twenty years.

She passed away April 1, 1939. Death was caused by complications following a fractured hip sustained Feb. 11, 1939. She was aged 57 years, 1 month and 26 days.

Special Dishes From All America Will Grace This Tavern's Tables



All of Cheyenne, Wyo., could dine here daily. The restaurant will serve 20,000 persons a day.

MOTHER, how would you like to cook for a family of 20,000 every day?

For that's the number of persons that will be served daily in the Three Ring Inn at the New York World's Fair pictured above. The largest restaurant in the Fair, it was opened to the public early in March—six weeks in advance of the official Fair opening—so as to break in its huge staff of cooks and waiters.

Designed after a Tyrolean tavern with side walls decorated with humorous old-fashioned murals, and the roof covered with brightly colored asphalt shingles, the inn is an attractive and intimate contrast with the modernism of most of the other Fair buildings.

Though designed to be used for only two years, the building is even

more staunchly built than the average house. Resting on 60-foot long wood piles driven to "resistance", it is as well-supported as a skyscraper. Fireproof cement exterior walls and fire-resistant asphalt shingles on the huge roof effectively protect it against outside sparks or flames and add to its festive coloring. A high tower with an onion-shaped roof is a landmark that can be seen from many parts of the Fair. The blended roof colors were designed by Albert H. Fay, colorist.

The Inn will serve famous American dishes, such as New Orleans Shrimp Gumbo and Chicken a la Maryland, as well as many Continental specialties, prepared by a staff of chefs under the supervision of Max Ludeke, who is known to thousands of food lovers in America and Europe.

From these windows, diners can see the Fair's theme center silhouetted against the sky. Old fashioned street scenes (top photo) are painted on the walls. Colorful red-brown asphalt shingles protect the huge roof against both fire and weather.
