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LAY CORNER STONE FOR CHRISTIAN HOME

Several hundred persons attended the cornerstone laying ceremony Sunday afternoon for the new Northwest Christian Home for the aged. It is a \$50,000 structure on the Walker Road near Beaverton, and has accommodations for 28 persons not counting employed help.

Mrs. Mary E. Parker, a member of the board of supervisors for the home, placed the cornerstone. The Rev. J. Eric Carlson of St. Louis, executive secretary of the National Benevolent Association of the Christian Church presided and gave the principal address. A large group of persons who have assisted in the construction of the home were presented.

Following the program there was inspection of the home, which will open May 1. The formal dedication is set for July 9.

At present the denomination maintains two homes in the Northwest one at Eugene and one at Walla Walla. These will be combined in the new Beaverton home. A two and a half acre tract surrounds the home here. Mrs. Laura Hill of the Walla Walla home will be the superintendent here.

The new building has been constructed on the unit plan, so wings may be added as needed.

NASH SALES DOUBLE

Nash retail deliveries in the Pacific-coast area for the month of March were nearly double those of March a year ago, according to word received yesterday by Guy Carr, local Nash dealer.

Milton N. Larson, Nash Pacific coast sales manager, reported increases in March of 97.4 per cent for the eight western states comprising the Pacific region. Mr. Carr announced, with a gain of 57.6 per cent for the three months of the first quarter.

The unusually sharp increases in retail deliveries for March, Mr. Carr asserted, were accounted for by improved business conditions and by the added momentum of spring sales.

Our gains in January and February were healthy increases over a year ago," Mr. Carr said, "but the deliveries for the past month have far outstripped our earlier sales marks."

National retail deliveries were nearly on a par with the gains scored on the coast, Mr. Carr said. Figures for the first twenty days of March, recently compiled, showed them 84.3 per cent ahead of the same period a year ago, with indications that when complete totals for the month are tabulated the national increase might reach the impressive 97 per cent gain chalked up by coast dealers.

Nash's spectacular climb this year has moved the company up to the position of fourth largest car producer in the automotive industry, ranking next to General Motors, Chrysler and Ford, Mr. Carr declared.

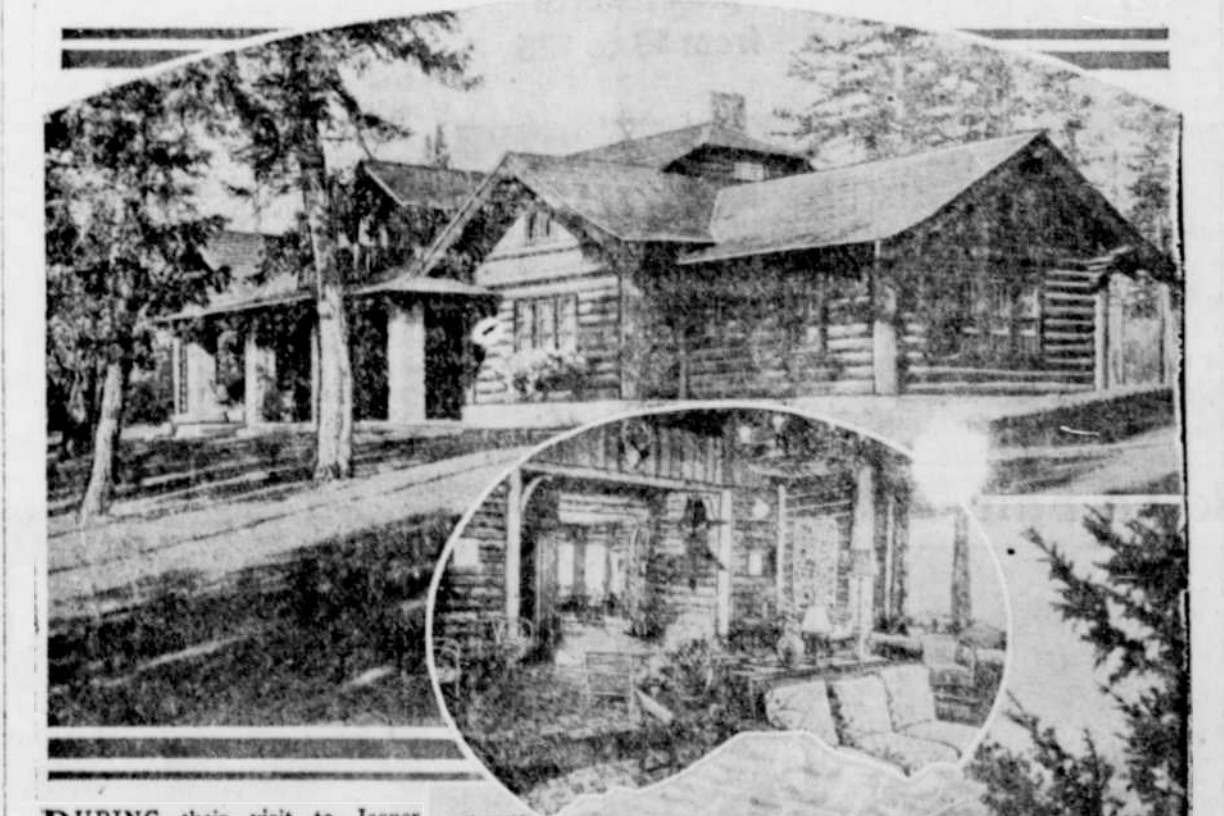
GARDEN CLUB NOTICE

Bungalow Home For King And Queen In Rockies



DURING their visit to Jasper National Park, Alberta, in the heart of the Canadian Rockies in June, Britain's King and Queen will occupy one of the bungalows at Jasper Park Lodge. The bungalow is of log construction, contains its own dining room, big living room with log-burning fireplace and several bedrooms, each with its own bathroom. The bungalow sits on a point of land jutting out into Lac Beauvert, one of the most colorful tarns in the Canadian Rockies and commands a view of Mount Edith Cavell which was named in memory of the British nurse who was executed by the Germans during the World War. The photographs show the exterior of the bungalow which will be the Royal Residence in Jasper National Park, a corner of the living room and Mount Edith Cavell as it is seen from the bungalow.
