A. H. Watson was in The Dalles over the week end. Thirty-three new houses have been built or are at present under construction in the West Slope area since the first of the year.

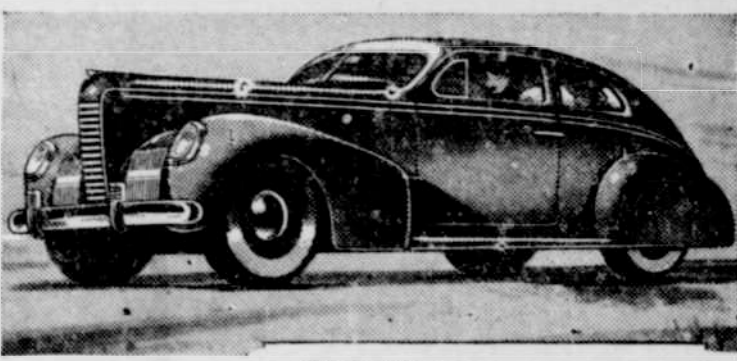
Mrs. Herbert Eckstrom gave a birthday party on Thursday for her little son Herbert, Jr., who was five years old that day.
